The altar flowers are given to the glory of God in honor of Ingathering Sunday by Laura and Christopher Calton.




MESSAGE AND LEAFLETS, CHANGE TO Rite II September 14. Holy Cross Day.

We are a diverse and inclusive community which is flexible around liturgy. This past summer, we used the supplemental liturgy from the Enriching our Worship book; we appreciated the different perspective offered. For Ingathering Sunday, September 14th, we will use Rite II to worship God, the more modern service from the Book of Common

Prayer (BCP). The service begins on p. 355 of the BCP. Of the four possible Eucharistic Prayers in the BCP, we will use Prayer B on page 367. You will have the opportunity to get used to this service since we will use it until the end of the church year, Christ the King Sunday, on November 23 rd . We look forward to being together each Sunday to grow deeper roots into God's presence and continue to strengthen our fellowship. I am deeply thankful for you all at All Souls Church!

An Update from the Tending the Soil Team

Stay Calm, stay connected, stay with conviction, and stay the course.

This advice came from a Tending Our Soil (ToS) learning lab on adaptive leadership that was held in the spring. As it turns out, this advice and the adaptive leadership framework also feel relevant for helping us to navigate the uncertain and tumultuous times we live in. The three big takeaways about adaptive leadership and leaders from our learning lab were: Adaptive leadership requires unlearning and a willingness to let go of past successes (i.e. What worked five years ago, won't necessarily work now.)

Adaptive leaders expect and work through resistance, rather than avoiding it--and remain in relationship with all. (i.e. View situations of resistance as a circle, rather than as opposing sides of an issue.) Adaptive leadership is a continuous process of learning, experimenting, and growing with others (i.e. We give ourselves the grace to fail and the freedom to try.)

In September, the All Souls ToS team (Mother Sara, John Longstreth, Tara. Mancini, Al Muller, Heidi Rasciner, and Donald Snyder) will embark on the third and final year of the program with the rest of the cohort. We will continue to build on the learning and work of the past two years that Heidi Rasciner detailed in the 2025 Annual Report (pg 26).



What is Holy Cross Day?



M major feast observed on Sept. 14 in honor of Christ's self-offering on the cross for our salvation. The collect for Holy Cross Day recalls that Christ "was lifted high upon the cross that he might draw the whole world unto himself," and prays that "we, who glory in the mystery of our redemption, may have grace to take up our cross and follow him" (BCP, p. 192). The themes of Holy Cross Day are powerfully expressed by the hymn "Lift high the cross" (Hymn 473).

This feast is known as "The Exaltation of the Holy Cross" in the eastern church and in missals and sacramentaries of the western church, and it is known as "The Triumph of the Cross" in the Roman Catholic Church. It was one of the 12 great feasts in the Byzantine liturgy. The 1979 BCP is the first American Prayer Book to include Holy Cross Day.

Historically, the feast has been associated with the dedication on Sept. 14, 335, of a complex of buildings built by the Emperor Constantine (c. 285-337) in Jerusalem on the sites of the crucifixion and Christ's tomb. This shrine included a large basilica and a circular church. Constantine's mother, Helena (c. 255- c. 330), supervised the construction of the shrine, and a relic believed to be the cross was discovered during the work of excavation. Claims by the Church of Jerusalem to have the cross date from the mid-fourth century, and the pilgrim Egeria mentions a feast commemorating the discovery of the cross in Jerusalem in the late-fourth-century.

This feast has also been associated with the exposition at Jerusalem of the cross by the Byzantine Emperor Heraclius (575-641). He recovered the relic from the Persians who took it from Jerusalem in 614 when they destroyed the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. Although the authenticity of alleged relics of the cross may be questionable, Holy Cross Day provides an opportunity for a joyous celebration of Christ's redeeming death on a cross.


