

In Celebration of National Hispanic and Heritage Month

First Woman of Latin American Descent as Ordained Priest



In 1972, Bavi Edna "Nedi" Rivera learned at a meeting that the Episcopal Church planned to begin ordaining women as priests. Raised in the Episcopal Church, she felt called to pursue the priesthood. One major obstacle, however, was her father—Bishop Victor Rivera of San Joaquin. Bishop Victor Rivera strongly opposed the ordination of women. Despite his opposition, Nedi Rivera entered the seminary and was ordained a deacon on June 28, 1975.

The Reverend Nedi Rivera earned her Master of Divinity in 1976 from the Church Divinity School of the Pacific in Berkeley, California. On May 5, 1979, she was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop C. Kilmer Myers of California, becoming the first woman of Latin American descent to be ordained in the Episcopal Church. Her father, Bishop Victor Rivera, did not attend the ceremony.

The Reverend Nedi Rivera later served as Rector of Saint George's Episcopal Church in Salinas, in the Diocese of El Camino Real, from 1984 to 1993. From 1994 to 2004, she led Saint Aidan's Episcopal Church in San Francisco as Rector.

Although English was spoken at home during her youth, The Reverend Nedi Rivera worked diligently to become fluent in Spanish. Now, she regularly preaches and celebrates Holy Eucharist in both languages.

First Hispanic Woman as Consecrated Bishop

In 2004, The Reverend Nedi Rivera was elected suffragan bishop in the Diocese of Olympia (Western Washington) and was consecrated on January 22, 2005, becoming the first Hispanic woman to be consecrated as bishop in the Episcopal Church.

During The Right Reverend Nedi Rivera's consecration, following the Church's tradition, fellow bishops gathered to lay hands on her while the ordination prayer was recited. Among them was her father, Bishop Victor Rivera (as previously stated, he was a vocal opponent of women's ordination). At a point in the ceremony, Bishop Victor Rivera vested his daughter, Bishop Nedi Rivera, with his own cope vestment. Reflecting on the moment, Bishop Nedi Rivera said, "He didn't change his mind; he changed his heart." Alleluia!

WOODLEY HOUSE FOOD COLLECTION
THIS SUNDAY the SECOND SUNDAY OF THE MONTH

This Sunday is the day that we collect food donations for the Woodley House Food Pantry. We collect food for their once-a-week distribution to many families and individuals who are food insecure from the surrounding neighborhood. An article in the Washington Post of September 29th, "Critical food insecurity still rising in the D.C. region," highlighted the growing need across the city, including "hidden hunger" among those who have never been food insecure before. The article pointed out some reasons for the growing crisis, including the retraction in Medicaid and SNAP (Food Stamp) benefits, and high food prices.

Please be generous and help your neighbors out! Last month we collected 11 bags of food for the food pantry, so let's try to break that record this month. When you go to the grocery store this week, pick up a few extra items from the Woodley House list of desired items (*list is also on the Welcome table*) and bring them to church with you on October 12th. You may place them in the narthex (off the parking lot and adjacent to the sanctuary), in the bin or the wagon there. If you cannot bring the food on October 12th, bring it with you another Sunday and put it in the bin in the undercroft.


