

"Be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect." (Mark 5:48) Yea, right!!! Who could possibly reach that level? It is most definitely beyond our human ability to ever be perfect, and never will a person attain the perfect of God in this life. So many things get in the way of perfection, pride, vanity, greed, lust, well you get the idea. The list is endless. So, why would Jesus ever give us a command that is unattainable? Our modern day definition of the word "perfect" is different from what the word meant in Jesus' time. To us, perfection is the best something can be, there can be nothing better than the perfect. The ancient understanding of perfection means doing one's duty or doing what is required. For example, you can have the most beat-up old jalopy of a car that is all rusted out but if you put the keys in the ignition and it starts and gets to where you want to go, then that car is perfect, it did the job required. The car doesn't look the best,

but it was perfect. What Jesus is asking us to do in today's Gospel is not to reach perfection as we think of it today, but rather to just do one's duty, which is to love and forgive. We will begin the sacred season of Lent in three days. Lent is a time for us to focus on trying to do what is required, to love and to forgive. We are being challenged to reach perfection just by doing our job. Lent may be challenging, as it should be, however we can all focus better on doing the job set before us.

We are planning several ways to help each of us to strive to reach Christian perfection this Lent. Ash Wednesday is on February 22. We will have liturgies at 9 am, 12 pm, 4 pm and 7 pm, with distribution of ashes following the homily. Every Friday during Lent we will offer the Sacrament of Reconciliation from 6 – 7 pm, as well as the usual time slot of Saturdays from 3:15 – 4pm. Since we are adding extra reconciliation time on Friday evenings, there will not be a single penance service this Lent. The Stations of the Cross will be prayed every Friday at 7pm and will conclude with the presentation of the Living Stations of the Cross on Good Friday at 3pm.

I know that we have all heard of the devastating earthquake last week in Turkey and Syria. The death toll is about 25,000 lives lost, with many still unaccounted for and several thousand severely injured. The destruction of buildings and property cannot even be measured yet. Thanks to the generosity of our parish community and donations to the needy fund, OLMC donated \$5,000 to Catholic Relief Services to assist their work in the earthquake zone. I hope that in addition to support of our food pantry, we can continue to provide donations to natural disaster relief when an event occurs. Thank you so much for your generosity to the needy fund.

PRAY TO END ABORTION

Cathy's Corner—The Mark of Cain

Adam and Eve did not have their creative juices flowing when they named their firstborn son Cain, since that word literally means "something produced," echoing Eve's own statement to that effect. But with Abel's name perhaps they had some unconscious precognition of his sorrowful fate, since it means "breath," even with a connotation of "transitory" placed in front of it. Indeed, his time on earth was as fleeting as a breath, struck down as he was in premeditation by his brother, who lured him to a field where no one could see the attack. The Lord, of course, sees everything, and the question posed about Abel's whereabouts was a mere formality.

How might the Lord have responded to Cain, however, if Cain had foregone the classic response of "I do not know. Am I my brother's keeper?" and instead broken down in anguished sobs over what he had done, begging God's forgiveness? That will never be known but what we do know is that God had warned Cain about the demon lurking at his doorway when he was resentful and crestfallen that his younger brother's offering was chosen over his own. God reminded Cain of his ability to master the sin of envy crouching in his path, waiting to pounce.

Even after Cain had succumbed to his bitterness toward the success of Abel in a brutal and deadly fashion, God protected him from retaliation for what he had done, permanently marking him as safeguarded by the divine. It was with God's help that Eve had produced her son Cain, and God's help stayed always with him. As well with the heartbroken parents, who had lost both of their children, given as they were another chance by God to create a family with the birth of Seth.

There is no clear explanation as to why God accepted Abel's offering and not Cain's, just like there is no clear explanation why some seem to live charmed lives, with good health, financial security and close families, while others struggle in sickness, poverty and loneliness. No matter where we fall in the spectrum of happiness and good fortune, like Cain, God's help is always with us. Still, should we succumb to bitterness and envy, engaging in destructive behavior toward another because of it, the metaphorical blood of the one we have injured will cry out to our God.

But we have the choice to take the road that Cain did not, asking forgiveness for what we have done from God and from our sister or our brother, trying once again to master the demon of sin ever crouching in our path. The mark of Cain is a sign of hope, a sign that no matter what we do God's help stays always with us. It is also a sign of how destructive our envy and bitterness can be. Let us keep sight of them both, and ever choose the path Cain did not take.

Leviticus 19:1-2, 17-18. Psalm 103:1-2, 3-4, 8, 10, 12-13. 1 Corinthians 3:16-23. Matthew 5:38-48.

"The Lord is kind and merciful" [Psalm 103].
