Second Sunday of Lent Page Two

We enter into the second week of Lent, and I pray that we are each being drawn deeper into mystery of our Salvation that this season calls us to focus on. Lent is that time to look inward at those things inside of us that need to be changed. However, the look inward should always lead us outward to see the needs of our brothers and sisters. The Gospel this weekend is the story of the Transfiguration. This story of Jesus up on the mountain with Peter, James and John takes place just before Jesus enters Jerusalem on what we call Palm Sunday. There are so many elements to this story that are worth pondering. I have always wondered what Jesus was discussing with Moses and Elijah? The Gospels never say. I tend to think it was a pep talk telling Jesus to stay focused. Jesus must have known that things were

not going to go well in Jerusalem and needed some encouragement. Perhaps Moses and Elijah were there to tell Jesus that everything will be ok? After all, He was still human, and the thought of suffering and death scares us. Part of the challenge of Lent is remember our own mortality. We use the phrase, "Remember that you are dust and unto dust you will return" on Ash Wednesday. Death is frightening, but something we must be constantly preparing for.

Another aspect to Lent is the call to keep our focus on the needs of others. Peter was so caught up in the magic of that moment that he wanted to build tents and stay there forever. Jesus told him no and said that we must enter Jerusalem. Jesus reminded Peter and reminds us that we are not to get caught up ourselves and look out for our own interests, but instead to constantly be asking what is best for those around us and how can I serve others? I hope that we can all focus a little bit more on the needs of others this Lent.

Lent is meant to be a challenge. These 40 days should not easy. This time calls us to focus on our mortality and being prepared. The best way to prepare is to focus on others. As we focus on the mystery of the Transfiguration today, may we each strive to be transformed into better disciples of Jesus Christ.

Cathy's Corner—Antitheses and Hypertheses and Fiery Gehenna

The Sermon on the Mount is one of the five great discourses in the Gospel of Matthew, containing the well-known Beatitudes, eight in number and beginning with "Blessed are . . ." Also included are the lesser known antitheses, six in total, presented in the very different format of "You have heard it

said . . . but I say to you." An antithesis is defined as "a contrast or opposition between two things" and these statements of Jesus appear to contradict Old Testament teaching. But perhaps on closer examination they do no such thing. For example, to his audience of fellow Jews, Jesus repeated the law given to Moses that "you shall not kill," proceeding to mandate that you shall not even be angry with your brother or sister.

Rather than a contradiction of time-honored directive, it is in fact an affirmation of it, while deepening it and radicalizing it, making it much more relevant to real life. No different than today, murdering another human being was an extreme and rare occurrence among most people, but exhibiting anger toward another by hurling insulting epithets a commonplace one. No less unusual was ignoring the one hurt by such behavior and proceeding to worship God as if nothing had happened. Or resorting to legal processes because reconciliation has not even been attempted due to obstinacy and acrimony. All of those run-of-the-mill, everyday ways of letting anger preclude treating another kindly and fairly make one liable to judgment just as would committing the act on the far end of that spectrum, murder.

So said Jesus in what some scholars would call a "hyperthesis," a returning to the original will of God but in its most superb and extravagant definition. Because the mercy of God is superb and extravagant. God forgets the sins of the most wicked of people should they turn from their wickedness, the prophet Ezekiel proclaims. And the Lord God rejoices when that happens, when someone chooses to do what is right and just, chooses a virtuous life so to abide forever with God.

But it is far too easy for any of us to turn away from a path of virtue, to break faith and commit sin as Ezekiel speaks of as well. It is far too easy because that starts with the smallest and most trifling of unkind acts. Which is why Jesus minces no words about the path to fiery Gehenna from what might seem to us minor fits of angry words or insignificant refusals to reconcile with others. Performing an act of worship alone will not put us back on the right path; only asking forgiveness from the one we have wronged will. It may not seem a superb and extravagant way to live, but Jesus would insist other-
