Cathy's Corner—The Tale of the Empty Tomb


The tomb was empty. Of that there was no doubt. The question that had split the Jewish community living in Jerusalem, indeed all the children of Israel who may have been in the city for the Jewish feast of Passover, was how that actually had happened. Jesus of Nazareth had been crucified and his lifeless body placed by Joseph of Arimathea in a new tomb he had hewn in the rock. Mary Magdalene and the other Mary had stayed at the tomb, keeping vigil over the place where their beloved teacher was laid to rest. The chief priests and Pharisees were so worried that the disciples of this controversial preacher would steal the body, pretending that he was raised from the dead, that they begged Pilate for guards to seal the stone covering the entrance to the tomb and maintain a watch along with the women.

Astoundingly, on the morning of the third day, the first day of the week as it were, the stone was removed and the tomb was empty. Then Mary Magdalene and the other Mary began making the preposterous claim that there was a great earth-quake and an angel of the Lord rolled back to the stone, telling them that Jesus had been raised from the dead just as he said he would be. They even made the allegation that, as they ran to tell the others this news, Jesus met them and spoke to them, and they embraced his feet.

However, the guards were spreading the story that the disciples of Jesus came in the night while they were asleep and stole the body. To complicate matters further, some people were whispering that the soldiers were lying and had actually been bribed by the chief priests with a large sum of money to make up that tale. But really, how could anyone believe the account of women, especially such a ridiculous claim that they saw Jesus raised from the dead, since under the Jewish law women were not even considered valid witnesses? Whatever version those in the Jewish community chose to believe, one fact was indisputable - the tomb was empty. Of that there was no doubt.

To people of faith today, of that there is still no doubt. But what version surrounding that fact do we hold firm? Is it just a story spread around to explain why we go to church on Easter Sunday? Or is it the cause of our joy that guides every action we take because we truly believe, since it was impossible for our Lord to be held by the throes of death, that nothing in our own lives is impossible for the God who raised him up? It all comes down to not only whom we believe but how we believe. Let our faith be not just a tale we tell but a world in which we dwell, one that embraces fully the hope of the Risen Lord.
