We enter into Holy Week on today, Palm Sunday. This week stands at the height of the year for Christians around the world. The celebrations of the Triduum are soon to here and next weekend is the great Feast of the Lord's Resurrection, Easter! This is a holy time of the year. I hope that we can all enter into the Paschal Mystery in a deeper way this week. However, it all begins today. Jesus makes his joyful entry into Jerusalem. The crowds and wild

with joy to see him. They are cutting down palm branches and having a huge parade to welcome him into the city. However, who did they come out to see? There were hundreds, maybe thousands of people welcoming Jesus today, what happened to them all when the passion began? We see three main groups of people. The first and largest group are all the people who turned so quickly. These are the fair-weather sports fans. When the weather is nice and things are going well, they are glad to support you. But when things get tough, they are no where to be found. It was the same with Jesus. As soon as the persecutions started and things got rough, they ran away. They were not going to suffer and be inconvenienced by this. They quickly fled and went back to old ways when Jesus asked just a little bit more from them. The next group are the people, such as many of the early apostles, who got scared. They wanted to remain close to Christ, but became paralyzed, at least momentarily by fear. They too ran and hid because they didn't want to be caught and have to suffer. The good thing was that these people later realized their blessings and came back to Christ with even great faith than before. The final and smallest group were the few that remained faithful to the end, such as Mary his mother, the other women at the foot of the Cross, and the beloved disciple. As we celebrate again Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, which of these groups of people do think you might fall into? That is a tough question is ask ourselves. We all want to say that we would remain faithful, but I am sure that many of us have experience doubt. It is hard to remain faithful during difficult time and in the face of temptation. Let us pray during this Holy Week that we may all continue to grow is faithfulness and in our calling as disciples.



The Triduum is the most sacred time of year for us and the liturgies are amazingly beautiful. We will celebrate the Lord's Last Supper on Holy Thursday at 7 pm. On Good Friday, the live stations of the cross presented by the youth of our parish will be at 3 pm. Confessions will be heard from approximately 6 pm until before the start of the Liturgy of the Lord's Passion at 7 pm. The Easter Vigil liturgy will be at 8 pm on Holy Saturday.

There are NO 9 am masses on the days of the Triduum. On Easter Sunday, there will be a sunrise mass at 6 am, and the standard times of 8:15 am, 10 am and 12 pm. I hope to see you there.

Cathy's Corner—How to Survive a White-Hot Furnace

What made King Nebuchadnezzar rise in haste to check on the Jewish men he had commanded be bound and thrown into the white-hot furnace? Did he have second thoughts about inflicting the death sentence on three individuals he had thought highly enough of to make administrators of the province of Babylon? Did he regret his childish fit of rage over their refusal to bow down to the golden statue he had made of a Babylonian god when he knew they worshiped the one God of their ancestors, especially since he only found out because of accusations from his own jealous courtiers?

None of the above. He heard them singing. And then he looked and saw them alive. Walking unfettered through the fire like it was a dew-laden garden. Accompanied by a fourth who looked like a son of God. He was actually an angel of the Lord, sent by God so that the fire could not cause them pain or harm. In the prison of the white-hot furnace they strolled freely, singing and glorifying their God, whom they would not deny even if God would choose not save them from a fiery death. It was their faith in that God they loved that made them free.

For John the Evangelist, writing to his community about 60 years after Jesus had died, that faith could only be true if it extended that love to Jesus, who was sent by God to do God's will in the world. The greatest sin for the Johannine community was denying Christ, which would forever enslave those who did so. In truth, the Jewish people had been politically enslaved quite often throughout their history – the Babylonian king Nebuchadnezzar and the Roman emperor Caesar Augustus merely being a few of the examples. But they had always been free in their faith in God.

Unlike the Jewish people, as a nation we have never been politically enslaved. Yet are we enslaved to the belief that one skin color is superior to the rest? To the conviction that certain ethnicities are more entitled to greater respect? To the confidence that prosperity is based solely on personal merit and ability? The increasing vitriol in our world has created a white-hot furnace burning away all the insidious shrouds that have cloaked unexamined acceptance of these assumptions. The only true freedom inside of that comes from faith in Jesus Christ which demands adherence to his unqualified mandate to see and treat every person with equal dignity and respect, recognizing the deep damage caused in so many ways because so often that still does not happen.

If we can fully live Christ's mandate, the sweltering furnace of acrimony will become a dew-laden garden where all walk together unfettered by the chains of hatred and hostility. May our joyful calls of inclusion raise such a clamor that even those who would choose to oppress and reject will rise in haste to see what is happening. And that figure they will see walking with us? An angel of the Lord of course!


