

Salt is one of the most valuable substances on earth. We may not think of it that way today considering most of our doctors are probably trying to tell us to limit our salt consumption. In Jesus' time salt was a highly prized commodity. You could barter for goods with salt and to have salt to add to food was a luxury few could afford. While today, salt

is plentiful and relatively inexpensive, it is still an important item. Our human bodies cannot function without some salt present. "The human body requires a small amount of sodium to conduct nerve impulses, contract and relax muscles, and maintain the proper balance of water and minerals. It is estimated that we need about 500 mg of sodium daily for these vital functions." (Harvard School of Public Health website). In today's Gospel, Jesus calls us to be the salt of the earth. I think this is a two-fold challenge to us. First, we are called to bring "flavor" to the life of others. We should be the ones bringing a little bit of happiness to others. Are people happy and excited to see us or do people try to avoid us? Are we bringing life and excitement into others or are we a burden to others? Just how are we bringing "flavor" into our homes, our workplaces, and into your community? Even more important than bringing "flavor" is to bring life. Just as physical life can't exist without salt present, are we nurturing the faith life in others? Are we sharing the Good News in such a way that people are being drawn deeper into the life of Christ? Life without salt is not possible, just as life without Jesus Christ is not possible. Are we truly being the salt of the earth?

Cathy's Corner—The Whole Truth in the Kingdom of God

Misinformation creeps out in many forms, but one of the most insidious is the half-truth, a mixing together of fact and fiction so that neither can be identified. It was true that God said the man and the woman could not eat from a tree in the garden, but false that it was from all trees. It was true that God said they could not eat from the tree in the middle of the garden, but false that they could not even look at it. It was true that eating of the forbidden fruit would open their eyes to good and evil but false that it would make them like gods because nothing could make a created thing into the one that had created it. So, confused by what was really true, and seduced by what was really false, Adam and Eve violated the one simple and straightforward command God had given them. And in an instant, rather than becoming like gods, they separated from God, the good and beautiful bodies God had made for them bringing them only shame. Cunning indeed was that serpent, interpreting a truth in a way that was false, leading the woman to do the same.

Jesus was aware of the danger of half-truths. He knew that he was becoming famous with people as a healer and an exorcist. But that was just a part of who he truly was. It was not until the cross and the resurrection that the whole truth would be revealed. His miraculous works were signs of the inbreaking of the kingdom of God, but the crowds just cared about witnessing a deaf man who could now hear and a mute man who could now speak. Hence he ordered those who had experienced his compassion and his mercy not to tell anyone. Because the resulting misinformation could become an insidious half-truth about the kingdom of God, characterizing it as only about seeking from the Lord our own healing and happiness while deciding for ourselves who is or is not worthy of the same. But the world God created for us is about so much more than that.

The simple and straightforward truth about the kingdom of God is that it is about prioritizing the needs of others who suffer so deeply and anonymously in this world that exists on our side of Eden. It is about seeing everybody as does our God, made in God's image and likeness, treating each therefore as precious and worthy of our compassion and our mercy. Can we reach out to God for healing for ourselves and those we love? Absolutely. But if that is all we do in our relationship with God we risk separating ourselves completely from the kingdom Jesus gave his life to open for us. We risk being seduced by the half-truth that our faith is only about us and God. Every body is good and beautiful, created by God and deserving of all that is good and beautiful. What miraculous works we can perform if we recognize that as the whole truth. Gn 3:1-8; Ps 32:1-2, 5, 6, 7; Mk 7:31-37

Without salt, how does the popcorn taste? Discuss how this relates to the Christian who maintains his/her salty walk despite what the world thinks. What is a salty Christian? How is one different from an unsalted one?

Lord Jesus Christ, in your holy face we see the face of God. Help us to keep our eyes always fixed on you, so that in everything we do, we may be pleasing to you. May we love you and follow you all the way to God's Kingdom where you live and reign with God the Father, in unity with the Holy Spirit, one God forever and ever. Amen.
