
"Peace be with you." Jesus continued to wish peace upon them multiple times in this Gospel. That is Christ's greatest desire for us, peace.

The mission after Easter has been handed onto us. We have to bring about the peace that we desire. That is a good question for each of us to reflect on during this Easter season, am I bringing peace? Are all my actions and dealing with people bringing peace or division? Christ wishes us peace, but it is up to us to bring it about.

I also want to wish everyone a blessed Divine Mercy Sunday. We always throw ourselves on the abundant mercy of God.

Cathy's Corner—Breaking Bread with a Stranger

What if the pair of travelers had never offered hospitality to the stranger they met on their way to Emmaus? What if they had been so absorbed in their own self-pity over all that had happened in Jerusalem, the brutal execution of the prophet they had hoped would redeem Israel, that they just let him continue to walk on when they approached their village? What if the fact that they had reached their own safe homes clouded their perception that, as evening was drawing near, this unknown man would be walking alone in the vast darkness between settlements which could be quite dangerous?

If that had been the case, they never would have known he was God. Because it was only in opening their home to him, in sharing a meal with him, in giving of their own resources to him, that they recognized this stranger as Jesus Christ, risen from the dead. In truth, they had been fleeing Jerusalem defeated, leaving the other disciples that had also experienced the deed and word of Jesus mighty before God that now seemed so meaningless. They were not convinced by the women who astounded them with the news that the body was not in the tomb, nor by the vision of angels proclaiming he was alive, nor even by the confirmation of others who went there and found it just as had been described. Indeed, shockingly, they did not even comprehend who this stranger really was from his interpretation of all in the Scriptures beginning with Moses and the prophets that referred to him.

Yet they felt something stirring deep in their hearts they could not ignore. It was a burning, subtle at first, but enough to make them reach for him, to not want to let him go. And when he took the bread, said the blessing, broke it and gave it to them, all of a sudden it flashed in their minds the multitude of times Jesus in his ministry had shared bread with others, had eaten with even the most rejected of society, had blessed the poorest and most vulnerable, and they knew it was Him. They recognized their Lord even as he disappeared from their sight. Did they remember that Jesus had said just a few days ago in the upper room that he would not eat again with his disciples until there is fulfillment in the kingdom of God? Did they realize then that fulfillment had indeed come in the resurrection of their Lord?

When they hurried back to Jerusalem, they learned that the Lord had appeared to Simon, forgiving him his three-fold denial. He had given him, and indeed all who believe in him, the power to heal in his name, and so Simon Peter was able to heal a man crippled from birth as Jesus himself had done so many times. And the burning in their hearts exploded in the knowledge that the Lord has truly risen. But only because they reached out in compassionate hospitality to a stranger they met on the way. May we never miss our chance to do the same. There is no end to the ways we ourselves will recognize Jesus every time we do. Acts 3:1-10; Ps 105:1-2, 3-4, 6-7, 8-9; Lk 24:13-35
