

#### April 22 & 23, 2023

Today's Gospel is the beautiful story of the disciples on the road to Emmaus. As with all the classic stories in Sacred Scripture there are so many layers to this story. Those two people who were close disciples but not among the Apostles were on going to a town called Emmaus. On the surface this seems like an ordinary occasion. However, recall that Jesus commanded just previously that his disciples were to remain in Jerusalem. So, we have these two people disobeying Jesus. They were doing the exact opposite of what they were instructed to do. Doesn't that sound familiar, we all do the same some-

times. We have all disobeyed Jesus at times in life and done something opposite of what we knew to be right. We can theorize as to why these two people did what they did. I tend to think they were scared and perhaps running away. They saw a few days earlier that happened to Jesus. I would guess that they were trying to get out of town if they could. The incredible thing is that Jesus appeared, although unrecognizable to them, and went with them. That is a great act of love. Jesus knew that these two were running away and had disobeyed him. Jesus still came to them and went with them in the opposite direction. When we are heading in the wrong direction in life, Jesus is still traveling with us. He never leaves our side and through the worst of times Jesus is waiting for the right moment to step back into our lives and get us to turn around. These two people did encounter Christ in the breaking of the bread, and they got up and went back to Jerusalem, back to where they were supposed to be all along. When we or a loved one are going down a bad path of life, know that Christ is going along for the ride and will always be there, waiting for the right moment to get us to turn around. How great is the love of God!!

The disciples recognized Christ in the breaking of the bread. This underscores the centrality of the Eucharist in our lives. We are celebrating a three-year period of Eucharistic Revival in our country. This year the focus is on the parish level. We will have several events in the coming months to educate ourselves on the great mystery of our faith, the true presence of Christ in the Eucharist.

I also want to update the parish on the status of the Bishop's appeal, the Catholic Ministries Annual Appeal. We made the initial appeal request in February and the generosity of the community was outstanding. Our parish goal was to raise \$82, 800. We have so far pledged \$98, 190 and have already collected \$79, 709. We should easily meet and exceed the goal due to your generous support. However, in 2022 we raised \$146, 200. That makes us currently \$50,000 down from last year. A parish is refunded 50% of all funds over the goal. Last year, our parish was given over \$30, 000 back, which was a tremendous help. If your finances permit, let's try to help our Diocese and our parish as best we can.

#### Cathy's Corner—Bringing the Verdict to Light

There was absolutely no question that the ultimate authority on religious doctrine for the Jewish people, the Sanhedrin, had judged the disciples of the crucified Jesus the Nazorean as inauthentic prophets. Two of their leaders, Peter and John, had been brought before that esteemed body of elders, priests and scribes and the verdict was that teaching in the name of Jesus was antithetical to the Jewish faith. Case closed. None of these scholars of the law needed to pay them one more scant bit of attention. They could disregard reports of their miracles as utter nonsense. For sure the apostles were causing harm to no one, and, in fact, curing many.

Except, along the way, great numbers of women and men were becoming believers in the Lord, and thus non-believers in the primacy of the Sanhedrin. Which is precisely why the high priest and his companions rose up against the apostles. They were awash with jealousy. Their prominence and prestige were dissolving right before their very eyes. The light of the apostles' works was all around them but they preferred the darkness of their desire to control and to dominate, to be admired and celebrated. Hence they laid hands on the apostles and thrust them into the shadows of the public jail. A minor and temporary inconvenience for ones who live the truth, because as Jesus told Nicodemus, those are ones who will always come to the light.

That is exactly where the angel led the apostles, to the early morning light of the temple where they stayed. And they taught. They did not hide in fear of future punishment. Indeed, they had no fear at all. They knew their works could clearly be seen by the world as done in God. As done in the light. And even more people then heard how God so loved the world that God gave God's only-begotten Son so all might have eternal life. Not to condemn the world to the dark but to save the world with the light. Still, those like the high priest and his companions condemned themselves by preferring the darkness of self-interest to the light of God's merciful love.

We, too, condemn only ourselves with our jealousy and our pettiness, with our greediness and our contempt, with all the unkind things we say and we do that we shroud from the gaze of others. Our choice to clench with iron fists our own prestige and preeminence plunges us into a darkness so inky we are blind to the distress of people standing right next to us. But the light is right next to us as well, waiting to be revealed by the truth that a life lived for others is a life lived in God. May it be our ultimate verdict that we prefer always the light, sent by our God to bring to us eternal life.
