

The Prophet Elijah (900 BC – 850 BC) was one of the main prophets of the Old Testament and his life and deeds are told in the 2 Books of Kings. Elijah comes at a time when Israel is divided. The time of prosperity under King David and King Solomon ended and the land was divided into the Northern and Southern Kingdoms. Elijah is most known for his confrontation with the priests of Baal and with Ahab and Jezebel. The first reading today tells the story of Elijah on Mount Horeb. He is there fleeing from Queen Jezebel and her wrath. Mount Horeb is also the mount on which Moses received the

10 commandments. This sets up Moses as the giver of the law and Elijah as the restorer of the law. Hence, that is why Moses and Elijah appeared to Jesus in last weekend's Gospel of the Transfiguration. It was on Horeb that Elijah encountered God in a light breeze. Which is a good reminder for us to seek God in the little things of life as well as in the big events.

Elijah is also an important figure for us Carmelites. He settled and lived for a long time on Mount Carmel. There is still to this day a spring of water called the Fountian of Elijah on Mount Carmel. The Carmelites consider the Prophet Elijah to be our spiritual father and example. The motto of the Carmelite Order is taken from Elijah in 1 Kings 19:14, "With zeal have I been Zealous for the Lord God of Hosts." Elijah is expressing a vibrant and living faith. He does not want to settle for mediocrity when it comes to his faith life. He wants a zealous relationship with the Lord. This should cause us to reflect on our relationship with the Lord, both individually and as a parish community. Are we being zealous in our pursuit of the Lord or have we settled for mediocrity? Do we just do the minimum? Do we just come to mass on Sunday out of a sense of obligation? Elijah was zealous and did not want to settle, do we? When people look at OLMC parish, do they see a community that is vibrant and zealous for the Lord or a community just doing the basics? These are challenging questions for us to look at individually and communally. We do amazing jobs in many areas, but what else can we do as a parish? How can we continue to make OLMC a parish that is vibrant and zealous for the Lord? Ideas??????

Cathy's Corner— Being Fed by Miracles

With the evangelist Matthew's addition in his version of the feeding of the five thousand that the number did not count women and children, the total figure of those who ate their fill could have been 20 or 30 thousand people. While that it is clearly a miraculous number to be fed with five loaves and two fish, the number of Israelites whom God was daily feeding in the desert as they journeyed toward the promised land was 603,550 males of twenty years or more who were fit for military service, not counting their wives and children. This surprisingly specific total is readily available in the Book of Numbers, which derives its name from the two separate censuses of the twelve tribes fleeing Egypt that it includes.

And they were none too happy about their monotonous diet of manna, even if it could be baked into loaves which tasted like cakes made with oil. And Moses was none too happy about their monotonous lament over not having fish, melons and cucumbers, served with leeks, onions and garlic as they used to enjoy for free. Of course, the delightful food for which they were yearning was only free because they were enslaved and so being fed to keep their strength up for their backbreaking labor. It is hard to blame Moses for having had enough of their self-pity.

Those whom Jesus fed with the five loaves and two fish had not even complained that they were hungry. They had just followed Jesus to the deserted place where he had gone to mourn the death of his cousin John the Baptist because they were hoping for his healing touch. They were yearning for his preaching about the kingdom. They were aching for his mercy. And although Jesus himself needed to heal from his loss, the compassion in his heart rose above his own pain and he tended to those needs. But certainly the five thousand plus women and children were going to get hungry – it was almost nightfall – and the disciples knew it. They saw their work as reminding Jesus of the lateness of the day so he could send them all home, his caring for them done for the night.

Jesus knew that ministering to others is never done and he knew that his disciples needed to know that. So he told them to take the initiative and provide food themselves, even though the crowd was still not asking for any. A little like Moses, perhaps, the disciples protested that such a task was too heavy for them as all they had was five loaves and two fish. And so Jesus fed them himself, blessing the repast as was the usual ritual for a daily Jewish meal. As with the manna in the desert, thousands upon thousands were fed. Indeed, that total was likely one-tenth of the entire Jewish population of Palestine at that time. A miracle, indeed. As was the manna in the desert. But both were asked for and received very differently.

Perhaps it is worth taking stock of all the ways we are fed by God, in the companionship of family and friends, in the shelter of home and hearth, in the natural beauty of the world that surrounds us. Indeed, is every breath we take not a miracle of life given and nurtured by the one who created us? Unlike the Israelites, may we not look back on bygone times with rose-colored glasses or bitterly complain about what we do not presently have. Rather, like those in the crowds, may we seek and acknowledge the Lord in what is before us and around us and in us, having absorbed the lesson Jesus was teaching his disciples. We will not need a miracle to be always able to provide nourishment for each other if we but recognize in what ways and how often we ourselves are nourished by our God.


