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
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### August 20, 2023

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#### Cathy's Corner— Choosing to Serve the Lord

Death, for Joshua, was drawing near. The Israelites had been living in peace for years in the land of Canaan. Joshua gathered the tribes, brought forward the ark containing the commandments, and reminded the people of all the Lord had done for them. How the Lord had rescued them and defended them and driven away their enemies, allowing them to live in a land that was already tilled and in cities that were already built. In no uncertain terms he directed them to observe and carry out all that was written in the book of the law of Moses, the heart of which was engraved in stone and carried in the ark. "Fear the Lord and serve the Lord completely and sincerely," Joshua commanded. And he directed them to choose, right then, between the Lord and all the other gods they had seen around them. Famously Joshua announced to all, "As for me and my household, we will serve the Lord."

For God is a holy God but also a possessive God, a God who expects the faithful love given to be returned as faithfully. In a relationship of mutual respect and love. The perfect vision of what a marriage between two human beings is meant to be. Of the 613 commandments in the law of Moses, very few deal with dissolution of marriage. The verses in Deuteronomy referenced by the disciples where Moses commanded a man give a woman a bill of divorce actually involve an odd situation involving second marriage to a wife one has divorced and who herself has been divorced. It does, however, by virtue of the discussion, implicitly ratify divorce itself.

And that divorce initiated by a man – in Palestine a woman was not allowed to take such action – could be for any "indecency." Rabbinical texts have stated that could include her spoiling a dish for him or he finding someone fairer than she. Jesus was having none of that. Not that he was against marriage. In fact, he disputed his disciples' rather extreme position that it is better not to marry if a man could no longer divorce his wife "for any cause whatever." Still the demands of the marital relationship are not for everyone, and some of those are ones who choose the single life as their way to serve God. But being married is also a way to serve God, since that committed relationship of mutual respect and love is to mirror the relationship our God has with us.

Indeed, a married couple's love for each other, if it does reflect the devotion and fidelity of God, by its very nature spills out into the world around, spreading the kindness and compassion, gentleness and mercy, that they share between themselves. The care they provide to each other expands into care they extend to others who are helpless and hurting and hungry. The bond that forms between them, therefore, is not one that can be dissolved "for any cause whatever." In an imperfect world, not every marital relationship can be thus described. But every marital relationship can be thus desired. And thus refined each day to mirror ever more closely God's love for us, God's own people. The household thus created is one that has, without a doubt, chosen to serve the Lord. Jos 24:1-13; Ps 136:1-3, 16-18, 21-22 and 24

"WHAT I DID THIS SUMMER" is usually the first essay of the school year for students. My own essay would include a trip to El Salvador, staying at Nuestros Pequeños Hermanos (Spanish for "Our Little Brothers and Sisters"). NPH was originally founded in Mexico, by Father William Wasson in 1954, as a home to care for orphaned,

abandoned and at-risk children. He created a safe place where children could thrive within a culture of unconditional love and faith at its core. Currently, NPH nurtures children and transforms lives in nine countries in Latin America and the Caribbean.

With permission from Cardinal George, I worked as a priest as the Regional Director of our NPH homes in Central America from 2005 until 2010. Last month, I returned to El Salvador, and as I walked through the enormous doors, the aromas of handmade tortillas mixed with the cow farm next door instantly filled me with memories from five years of service there. I instantly smiled and thought to myself, what a blessing to be back here! I knew, of course, I would be sacrificing many of the creature comforts of home during my visit.

While I was there, NPH celebrated its 24th anniversary of operating a home in El Salvador. We began the day with an early Mass, and I was uplifted knowing the tradition of full and active participation in the liturgy still exists there, as over 500 children enthusiastically sang and responded to the prayers.

After Mass, everyone changed out of their "church clothes" and into their "play clothes." By 9 a.m. it was already 95 degrees, so I, too, decided to change out of my black suit and roman collar and into a T-shirt and sandals. It was a good decision because the day's next activity was an hour-long Zumba/salsa class! Did the bishop Zumba and salsa? Yes! However, trust me when I say that I lacked all skill and grace while doing it—it was an exercise in true humility that also got my heart pumping.

The rest of the day was filled with games and soccer tournaments as we basked in each other's warm friendship and lively conversation. The highlight for the children was being served hotdogs, a bag of chips and a can of pop for lunch. While you may think this is rather basic food, these children are accustomed to eating rice and beans daily, so this was a wonderful and welcomed treat.

After my morning holy hour the next day, I waited for the daily ritual of the water trickling on at 6 a.m. After showering, I dressed in my black suit, roman collar and pectoral cross and got into a pickup truck to drive across the border to Guatemala—a trip that should have taken about two-and-a-half hours. However, because of the condition of the roads scattered with potholes and fallen trees, the drive took almost four hours.

I arrived in the town of Santa Rosa de Lima to ordain Juan Carlos Pirir. For the past four years he has been a seminarian studying for the Diocese of Joliet. After completing his studies, I ordained him a priest there in his hometown as he was surrounded by his parents, siblings, relatives and just about everyone else from the town.

Before and after the Mass, fireworks were launched. And outside of the church, with its large choir and sacred music, the spirit of fiesta filled the air with booming music along with colorful balloons, banners and decorations. It was an amazing celebration and reflected the deep faith in that community, which formed Father Juan Carlos Pirir and fostered his vocation.

Back in El Salvador, a strong storm came through and knocked out the power my last night there. But instead of being upset by this inconvenience, I was thankful for the rain which cooled everything down, including me.

As I went to bed, I thanked God for keeping me safe during my travels. I asked for special blessings upon the dear children of NPH and upon Father Juan's proud family and supportive community. My "summer essay" would thank God for the comforts we enjoy "back home" and often take for granted: our safety, food, water, electricity and our parish communities.
