

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus asks the disciples the most important question ever, "Who do you say that I am?" This is the most important question in life and will determine the whole course of your life. Who is Jesus Christ to you? There are many misperceptions of Jesus. To some people, He is the great judge before we will stand trial for our lives. While partially true, God is so much more. To some God is the divine accountant who is keeping track of our good deeds and our bad deeds. One day, He will open the ledger book and determine run the tally of each column to determine where we go.

Again, a very simplistic view because God is so much more. For some God is the Maytag repair man in the sky. We only go to him when we need something fixed. To some, God is just Santa clause, who comes once a year to bring us gifts. To some, God is a divine vending machine, we put our dollar in (aka a good deed) and we deserve to get what we want in return. So, when we don't get good things in return, our whole world gets up ended. For some, God is just aloof and on the mountain top with no real presence in our life. The list of examples is endless of the ways that people can view God. So, who do you say that I am? How we choose to relate to God will determine the direction of our life. The early disciples were filled with different views as well. To some a prophet had returned. To some, just another holy man. To some, a troublemaker who needed to be eliminated. Who do you say that I am? Peter got the right answer, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." While we are still trying to figure out what exactly that means, we know God is beyond any of our understandings. Our answer to that question will change as we grow and go through the stages of life and our own experiences. However, the goal is to have the same answer that Peter gave, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God." Who do you say that I am?

Cathy's Corner—Clearing the Vineyard of Buckthorns

Buckthorn has been termed "a restricted noxious weed." It is a large shrub that affords no real shade and spawns forest fires. The noble trees, the olive, the fig, even the vine, refused the honor of reigning over the other trees. But not the buckthorn. It had no problem at all offering the protection that it never intended to give. In Jotham's fable, Abimelech was that buckthorn. He was the son of Gideon through his concubine and had campaigned to become king. His father had previously refused to accept that title, saying to the Israelites who were begging him to do exactly that, "The Lord must rule over you." To that end, Abimelech had just murdered all seventy of Gideon's other sons.

The Israelites, who had once again strayed into worship of false gods, were in the process of acceding to Abimelech's aspirations of royalty. In an effort to try and stem this treacherous tide, Jotham, Gideon's nephew, used a parable to illustrate how noxious and dangerous a human king can be. It did not work, and Abimelech ruled for three years before the citizens of Shechem turned on him. Jesus also used a parable, his to illustrate how generous and compassionate the divine ruler always is. Gideon knew that, which is why he refused the entreaty of his fellow Israelites. He knew that we are not meant to rule over one another; we are meant to look out for one another.

That is precisely what the landowner did for the laborers in Jesus' tale, those people who never gave up hope that someone would eventually give them the opportunity to work in order to support themselves and their families. The landowner was not trying to campaign for public office by responding bountifully to the workers that worked for him less than a full day. He was not looking to rule over them with his beneficence. He was just reflecting the divine priority of preferential care for the poor and disenfranchised, overlooked by everyone else, left with no other option but to stand patiently on the sidelines waiting to be seen, waiting to be respected for what they could offer. The last workers were not given a handout by the landowner to ease his conscience; they were given dignity. They were seen as worthy to contribute.

None of that took anything away from those who had worked a full day. But it did make those last workers equal to them in the eyes of the landowner. And that is what had them rankled. Because they wanted him to view them as better, as more dignified, as more worthy of respect. Unlike Gideon who rejected being placed above his fellow Israelites, they wanted to be seen as more. But God sees no one of us as more, no one of us as more deserving. God sees us as equally God's own children, and thus those that have less should be given the preferential option to have more. And God expects us to look out for one another so that does in fact happen. If our field of vision is the vineyard of the Lord, buckthorns we will not be, offering always to others that protection we fully intend to give.


