The Leper in today's Gospel couldn't keep his joy in despite being told by Jesus not to speak of this. I wonder if Jesus was using reverse psychology. The more you tell a person not to do something, the more the person is tempted to do it. The cured leper couldn't contain his joy any longer and it busted out to the greater glory of God. The fame of Jesus spread through the land

because of this man. I wonder how many more people came to know Christ because this man proclaimed the praise of God? On this final Sunday of Ordinary time, how are we proclaiming the praise of God in our lives? Are we living with the same passion as this cured leper did and wanting to share what Christ has done for us? Maybe we all need a little more glory and praise in our lives.

Wednesday, February 14, in addition to being Valentine's Day, is Ash Wednesday. We begin our sacred season of Lent. The masses and distribution of ashes will be at 9am, 12pm, 4pm and 7pm. Ash Wednesday is not a holy day of obligation but is still one of the most attended days. How I wish every Sunday and holy day would get crowds like Ash Wednesday does. It is a day of fast and abstinence, so you might need to celebrate Valentine's Day later. We have many activities during Lent to help draw the community deeper into the Paschal Mystery. We will have the Stations of the Cross on Fridays of Lent at 7pm in the Chapel. Every Tuesday in Lent, except during Holy Week, we will have our Carmelite lectures and discussions. In the first week, Fr. Leopold Glueckert, O.Carm., will lead us through the early history of the Carmelite Order and the Rule of St Albert. Fr. Bob Colaresi, O.Carm. will spend two evenings sharing with us the message of St. Therese of Lisieux. Fr. Jack Welch, O.Carm. will have two sessions covering St. Theresa of Avila and St. John of the Cross. Please come on out on those evenings and learn a little more about what makes our Carmelite community so special. We are also in the Year of the Eucharist. Joyce Donohue, a noted Eucharistic speaker from Mayslake ministries, will be presenting on Wednesday March 13. I hope that you take advantage of these opportunities to deepen your faith during this Lent. Additionally, the Lent Reconciliation evening will be Thursday March 14. I hope everyone has a blessed and faith deepening Lent.



Cathy's Corner—The Power of Love

Love is a transformative emotion. It can turn a person into someone unrecognizable by even him or her own self. Solomon loved his wives, all seven hundred of them, and that did not even take into account his three hundred concubines. Many of these were foreign women, like the daughter of Pharaoh, and many were from nations that long ago the Lord had forbidden intermarriage with lest these pagan relationships turn the hearts of the Israelites to their strange gods.


This forewarning by the Lord came true in Solomon, who began his reign building a majestic temple in devotion to the one true God and ended it constructing places of worship in honor of pagan god after pagan god. Likely he himself did not even recognize the idolator he had become. The Greek woman who fell at the feet of Jesus was from Tyre, a port city in ancient Phoenicia, which at that time was part of the Roman province of Syria. Hence, she was Syrophoenician. She was as much a pagan as most of Solomon's wives.

But she loved her daughter. She loved her daughter enough to enter a house that was not her own as a woman who was considered little more than a piece of property to seek out a man from a religion that despised her people. She loved her daughter so much she did not even flinch in the face of outright insult by Jesus himself at her request that he free her daughter from a demon. Likely she did not recognize that in that moment she had become a person who demonstrated more faith in the one true God than Solomon did himself. And it was that faith which brought the healing she so desired to her daughter.

Love indeed transforms us, as it did Solomon and the Syrophoenician woman, so we must be careful what we love. It was not the love Solomon had for his wives that was so destructive, but rather the love that he developed for their idols made of wood and stone. The Syrophoenician woman's love for her daughter, on the other hand, developed into a courageous devotion to a healer from another religion that she recognized as the Lord. Let us nurture our love for the living things that have been made by God and diminish our devotion to the icons created by our world, thus turning our hearts ever toward a deeper love for God. We may not even recognize the courageous believers we will become.


