

Dear Our Lady of Mount Carmel community, I am immensely proud to share with you the financial statement of the parish for the fiscal year 2022 – 2023. I don't know why we wait until January, when the fiscal year ends in July, but I have been told that this is what the parish has

always done. This also marks my first full year as pastor and responsible for the budget. I am proud to say that we are in good financial shape. I owe a huge thank you to each and every parishioner who supports and loves OLMC. It is only by your generous support that everything we do is possible. Thank you, Thank you, Thank you! We also owe a debt of gratitude to the members of the finance council who generously volunteer their time and knowledge to help us make sound money decisions. The parish also thanks our business manager, John Hawkins, and our bookkeeper, Kathi DeMasi, who serve us so diligently.

Once again, thanks to all of you, the parish operated in the black. We paid all the bills, covered all the expenses, and finished \$737 ahead. That is what a non-profit organization hopes for. The reason why the profit margin was slim when compared to previous years is due to the number of improvement projects that occurred. We made a significant upgrade to the security system that now includes automatic locking mechanisms on all the doors and camera monitoring (smile because you are on camera in all the primary areas of the building and in the parking lot). We installed new handicap door mechanisms. We have upgraded and are still fine tuning the sound system. We installed TV monitors and furniture in the lobby to make it more welcoming. We replaced the patio bricks in the front entrance. We had a confessional room installed. The rectory house had to have a new roof put on in addition to other interior renovations. We accomplished many big-ticket items. That is in addition to all the routine plumbing, hvac, electrical and IT work that is always ongoing.

As we are now halfway through the 2023 - 2024 fiscal year, things continue to look positive. We have been trending upward in mass attendance and have seen a noticeable increase in the weekend collection. The donations for Christmas 2023 are also considerably up from 2022. Once again, from my heart to yours, thank you for your love for Our Lady of Mount Carmel Parish.

Cathy's Corner—Ears That Can Hear the Parable of the Sower

The seed is precious yet the sower spreads it lavishly and with abandon. It is bursting with life and where it lands it will take root. But what will it yield? Hateful rhetoric if devoured and used as nutrient for those who twist the word of God to advance their own evil, self-glorifying agendas. Empty words if absorbed by those who proclaim love of neighbor but wilt and wither in the face of widespread prejudice and social stigma. Hypocritical proclamations if soaked into those who recognize the Gospel message to share physical and emotional resources with those in need but choke on their own self-gratifying desires to thus produce no aid. An invitation to the Kingdom of God if embraced by those who hear the parable and understand how to be the rich soil that will produce the abundant fruit of mercy and love for all.

Hateful rhetoric, empty words and hypocritical proclamations misuse the precious seeds of the Gospel and cause damage and pain wherever they sprout. Perhaps that is why the Lord wished to protect his powerful message from those who would not understand it for what it is, a call to self-emptying love. Much harm has, indeed, been caused through the years in the name of God. We, however, have been given the ears we need to hear Jesus' call, to take the seed that falls on the path as our own by forcefully rejecting those who foment division, to knock out the rocks we encounter by growing strong in our defense of the ridiculed and the reviled, to pull out the relentless thorns we cultivate by reducing our own consumption and increasing the opportunities to consume for the hungry and the homeless. We can be the rich soil that feeds the precious seeds of the word of God. We must be if we wish to join David in the Kingdom promised to him by the Lord. We will be when we listen with the ear of our heart.

Groundhog Day?

If Candlemas be fair and bright, Come, Winter, have another flight. If Candlemas bring clouds and rain, Go, Winter, and come not again.

February 2 is much more than Groundhog Day. Many years ago, before the revised liturgical calendar, Candlemas was celebrated. Farmers in Europe thought that the weather could be predicted on Candlemas thinking that as they were approaching the second half of winter, the weather would be the opposite of what Candlemas brought. Mr. Groundhog only came into the picture about 100 years ago, as hibernating animals were beginning to emerge at this time.

Today, the church celebrates the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord on February 2. The presentation is also the fourth joyful mystery of the rosary.

The presentation is 40 days after Christmas. Mary and Joseph, following the law, "presented" Jesus "to be consecrated to the Lord". They offered two turtle doves in thanksgiving for the safe birth of Jesus. The turtle doves were offered by the poor as required by the law.
