



The Feast of Our Lady of Mount Carmel

This is a wonderful day of celebration for our parish community. July 16th is the Feast Day of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. It is patronal day for our parish and for the Order of Carmelites. We are so blessed as a faith community, and it is all due to Our Lady. Let us celebrate the blessings of Mary on this great occasion.

The first hermits, believed to be former soldiers in the crusades, started to assemble on Mount Carmel near modern day Haifa, Israel, in the late 12th century. "Carmel" which means "Garden of God" was an oasis in a barren place. There was also a naturally occurring spring of water called a wadi there, so Mount Carmel became a good location for the hermits to live and it provided for their basic needs. The hermits lived separately but came together for the celebration of the Eucharist and other special occasions. Circa they year 1207 AD, the hermits sought to be officially recognized as a religious community and St. Albert of Jerusalem, the Patriarch of Jerusalem at that time, granted the brothers that recognition. The first brothers had a strong devotion to Mary. It was a common practice at the time, and still is, to dedicate a site to Our Lady of the place. So, Our Lady of Mount Carmel was named. The first hermits took the official name of the Brothers of Our Lady of Mount Carmel. The fact that we called ourselves brothers to Our Lady has always shaped our relationship. Carmelites tend to have a very familial relationship to Mary since we regard her as a sister. She guides us more as a peer since we are her siblings. The devotion to Our Lady of Mount Carmel has grown through the centuries and the Order of the Brothers of the Blessed Virgin Mary of Mount Carmel (Carmelites for short) has been blessed with so great a lady as our sister. The traditional flower associated with Our Lady of Mount Carmel is the sunflower, hence the arrangements around the statue all have sunflowers. The sunflower always turns toward the sun and follows it through the sky. The unique thing is that it will point its flower downward. This is a sign of Mary following her Son in humility. She follows her son with head bowed down. May Our Lady continue to bless all the brothers and sisters devoted to her on this special day.

Cathy's Corner—Seeing the Face of God in Transition


Jacob was in transition. He was leaving the home of his father-in-law Laban, who had tricked him into marrying the older sister of the woman he loved, in order that he would serve him longer in payment for the younger daughter. After serving Laban for twenty years, at the direction of the Lord he was heading to the land of his birth with his two wives, their two maidservants, and all the children he had conceived with the four of them. Waiting for him there was his brother Esau, his elder by the few minutes it took for Jacob to follow him out of the womb.

Jacob had tricked Esau twice, first into exchanging his birthright for a meal when he had come to him starving. No small privilege that was to barter away as it entitled the first-born son to a position of honor in the family and a double share in the possessions inherited from the father. The second subterfuge was done in cahoots with his mother Rebekah, who had favored Jacob from the beginning, when he deceived his father Isaac into conferring upon him his deathbed blessing for God's abundance, meant for the first-born son. This was the first time since all that occurred that the brothers would cross paths. Jacob had sent bountiful gifts ahead of him for his brother and sent his family and possessions on as well. He himself, however, stayed where he was, spending the night alone, perhaps ruminating on where he had come from and where he was going.

It is not clear, even in the mind of biblical scholars, who exactly was the man Jacob spent that night wrestling with, why the scuffle took place, or even who actually came out the victor. Was it the creature of the night that may have been an angel or may even have been God who could not overcome Jacob until he struck his hip? Or was it Jacob, physically debilitated but spiritually triumphant, having received the new name of Israel to symbolize that he contended with divine and human beings and had prevailed? Truth be told, all that really mattered to Jacob was that he believed he had seen the face of God and lived. And that gave him the confidence he needed to dust his hands of Laban and face his past in Esau.

Transitions are part and parcel of the human existence, most not as dramatic as Jacob's. But in all of our transitions it is vital that we take some time to encounter God. Perhaps we are wrestling with God, as was Jacob, over fear of the future or confrontation with the past. Maybe we are hoping from the Lord for healing of one of the variety of demons that afflict us physically, mentally or spiritually, as were those who sought out Jesus. Or maybe we just feel troubled, abandoned by God and alone. Like Jacob, however, being the victor in whatever transition we are facing is less important than being in the presence of God. Which we always are, but sometimes we just need to dedicate some time to remembering it, most especially as we stand poised on a new horizon, unsure of how to proceed. It is in that encounter with God we will receive the confidence to go forward, knowing that God accompanies us in whatever transition lies ahead.
