

The parish staff worked hard. The liturgy coordinators did a fine job. The combined choirs practiced extra and truly

lifted all our voices up to the heavens. A special thank you goes to our party planners extraordinaire, Karen and Mike Flavin. They along with the other members of the parish council planned the day and arranged all the details. It was glorious. The big weekend followed a wonderful week of vacation bible school. The youngsters had a great time. It was amazing to have our parish alive with the sounds of children laughing and having a good time in the house of the Lord. Again, thanks to our parish staff for all their work on VBS and for all the volunteers who helped. There really are some exciting things happening at OLMC.

I want to spend a little time during these summer weeks to reflect upon some Sacramental issues in our community and in the church that are often misunderstood. One of the Sacraments that perhaps has a great deal of confusion surrounding it is the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick. The biggest misconception to try to dispel is the term "last rites." There is no such thing! I grit my teeth every time I hear that said. The proper term is Anointing of the Sick. The whole point of the Sacrament is to pray for healing, not a happy death. The Catechism of the Catholic Church #1514 states, "The Anointing of the Sick is not a sacrament for those only who are at the point of death. As soon as anyone of the faithful begins to be in danger of death from illness or old age, the fitting time for him or her to receive the sacrament has certainly already arrived." The proper time to receive the Sacrament is when a serious illness begins, not when life is about to end. When you or a family member is seriously ill, the time to call for Anointing is days, weeks, months even before the person reaches the terminal stages. It is best done when the person can still speak and has knowledge of what is occurring and can actively share in the prayers. We want to pray for healing for the sick and strength for family members, not for imminent death.

Cathy's Corner— True Disciples of Jesus Before Their Time

The midwives are in truth unsung heroes of the Book of Exodus. The children's children of Joseph and his brothers, the sons of Israel, and their descendants beyond, had continued to thrive in the land of Goshen. Pharaoh replaced pharaoh until no longer was there felt an allegiance to that long ago, larger-than-life Hebrew who had saved Egypt from the great famine. Indeed, a great fear grew in the current Pharaoh that these strong and fertile people would eventually outnumber the native Egyptians on the northeast border and ally with his enemies in time of war. And before they knew it, the peace and freedom the Israelites were experiencing on the land they had rightfully been given was stripped from them. In its place were cruel oppression and bitter slavery.

Still, hard work in brick and mortar at the hands of brutal taskmasters did not stop the enslaved population from growing. So Pharaoh went to the midwives and demanded that any boy birthed by a Hebrew woman must be killed on the spot; only the girls might live. Many scholars believe these women were actually Egyptian and not themselves Hebrew. Whatever the case, the midwives feared God and so defied Pharaoh's evil stipulation, adroitly explaining that the Hebrew women were so robust that they all gave birth before the midwives even arrived. Pharaoh's murderous scheme was not to be derailed, however, and he then commanded every of his subjects to throw into the river any Hebrew boy that was born.

Regardless, a great many were saved by the midwives who were brave and who were clever and who respected the God of life above all else. Likely their families were horrified that they were facing down a vicious despot who clearly had no qualms about murdering even the most defenseless of babies. Yet they were an example of the true disciple Jesus would describe centuries later, prioritizing following God before any familial or national allegiance. By saving other lives they were risking losing their own, rejecting the false peace of going along to get along to embrace the righteous sword of protecting the children of enslaved people.

Although we may take pride in living in a country where slavery is no longer legal, we need not look very far to recognize the forced labor and inhumane conditions that exist in the prison system, overwhelming affecting people of color due to racial and ethnic disparities. Or to see the immigrants detained in detention centers in squalid surroundings, including asylum-seeking children, many whose health and safety are endangered. Jesus minces no words in mandating that allegiance to God must take priority over allegiance to anything, or anyone, else. We are called by Jesus to act as did those resourceful women in the time of Pharaoh, to strike down false peace with the sword of justice. It takes the bravery of the midwives to defend the people despised by those in power or even by those in our own families. In so doing, however, we too will be unsung heroes. And, more importantly, we too will be worthy of our Lord Jesus Christ.
