

Wow, it is scary to think that we are at the end of July. That means that summer is almost over! Schools will be starting in just a few weeks, much to the chagrin of the students probably. I certainly hope our young people enjoy the time they have remaining before it is back to doing homework and taking tests.

The Gospel today has the parable of the man finding a treasure in a field and then selling all he has to buy the field. It tells us of finding what really matters in life, which is a good rela-

tionship with the Lord. However, that comes at a price. There are several interesting questions that this short parable raises for us. If he found this treasure in a field, why didn't he just take it? It sounds like the person was alone and no one else saw the treasure. If there were people around, then there might be competition to get it or someone might have just stolen it. Whoever the previous owner of the field was, he or she must not have known the treasure was there. This parable raises many good questions for us to reflect on. Which is what a parable is supposed to do. They are not meant to be straightforward. A parable is supposed to tease our brains a bit and get us to think about the deeper message. Despite the many questions the parable to the treasure in the field raises, the main point is that the person was willing to make the sacrifice to gain the treasure. The person bought the field. I am sure it cost the person a good amount of money. It didn't come easy. That is the nature of eternal life, it doesn't come easy. We too will have to make sacrifices and give up much in order to achieve it. Good things don't come easy, and neither will eternal life. I hope that we are willing to do what it takes to buy the field with the treasure in it.

Two weeks ago, the Diocese of Joliet gave permission for parishes to resume the reception of the Blood of Christ from a common cup. It was banned during covid for logical reasons. Each parish was instructed to go slow on the implementation and always keep the needs and health of the community as primary. You may have noticed that the clergy have stopped using individual chalices and all receive from a common chalice. I hope that by the end of August, we will resume the option to receive the Blood of Christ here at OLMC. I will be exploring the best ways with our extraordinary ministers to do so in the healthiest and most hygienic manner possible.

Cathy's Corner— Cultivating Manna in Our World Today

According to a *New York Times* article published a little over ten years ago, "manna is real and some chefs have been cooking with it." The word itself is said to have been derived from the Hebrew *man hu*, meaning "what is it?" We may well ask the same question. The dozens of varieties of manna encountered today are mostly dried plant sap or honeydew excreted from the bugs that have eaten it. It is sweet from the glucose and fructose it contains. Modern day chefs might not consider the existence of manna as God's answer to a prayer, but it still does appear as if out of nowhere, without being cultivated.

In the Book of Exodus it was a gift of the Lord from heaven, given in response to the complaints of the ravenous Israelites without even the tiniest of reprimands that once again they were ungratefully grumbling that they were better off enslaved in Egypt. Indeed, some even ignored Moses' directive to gather only what they needed to eat for the day. Manna has no protein and cannot be harvested in quantity. The children of Israel found when they tried to do so, by the next morning it was wormy and rotten. Still, the Lord blessed them abundantly with the manna they needed every day.

We too are blessed abundantly every day with the manna we need as well: the precious seeds of the kingdom of God. Jesus' parable of the sower poses the critical question of how we will receive them. Are we a paved path, so hardened in our own self-absorption and so focused on our own comfort and enjoyment that no heavenly seed of generosity can penetrate? Are we so littered with rocks that crave approval and fear taking an unpopular stance that the divine seed of defending those facing discrimination and rejection shrivels immediately under the critical gaze of others? Are the thorns of prioritizing our work over our relationships so deeply embedded that the sacred seed of compassionate caring is choked by indifference and disaffection? Each of these seeds, poured out on us by our gracious Lord, in good soil can produce one hundredfold the luxurious garden of love and peace that is the kingdom of God.

To paraphrase *The New York Times*, these seeds are real and some people have been cultivating with them. Right here in front of us. Every day. Like the manna, both then and now, they appear as if out of nowhere, in the diverse and sundry ways that people do minister to each other, volunteering at the food pantry, giving an elderly neighbor a ride to church or the store, listening to the troubles of a co-worker, forgiving for yet another time an inconsiderate friend. These seeds may seem so small, but they are as sweet as manna. And they bloom into the most beautiful of trees that feed more and more and more from their fruit, because kindness has a way of being passed on to the next person in need. Thus never do even the cultivators hunger as they grow the Kingdom of God.


