I was blessed to be the assistant coach of Joliet Catholic Academy's boys' lacrosse team for 6 years. Funny, since I never played lacrosse in my life, they just needed a warm body out there to help supervise. Fortunately, the head coach was very skilled and a from college lacrosse player, so he knew what he was doing. I just had to read the rule book and stay one step ahead of the boys. It was a great opportunity to watch a group of boys who had never played lacrosse and help them develop and actually win a few games. The whole point of practice was devel-

oping the fundamental skills of handling the stick and ball and game play. Naturally, the boys wanted to race ahead and learn trick shots and advanced plays. The head coach and I continually tried to get them to focus on the basics. If you don't have the basics, the advanced techniques will not work. Our spiritual life is much the same way, we need to constantly work on the basics. Lent calls us to look at the basics of faith and how well we are living them out. What foundations might need to be shored up in us? The Gospel today has the classic verse of John 3:16, "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in might not parish but might have eternal life." That is the foundation of our faith!

This is Laetare Sunday. It marks the halfway point of Lent. I am looking forward to breaking out the rose (pink) vestments again. Traditionally, this Sunday has been a day of celebration, within the austere period of Lent. This Sunday gets its name from the first few words of the traditional Latin entrance for the Mass of the day. "Laetare Jerusalem" ("Rejoice, O Jerusalem") is Latin from Isaiah 66:10.

This is a busy week in the parish. The Carmelite lecture series continues on Tuesday 3/12 at 7pm. Fr. Jack Welch, O.Carm. will be presenting on an introduction to the spirituality of St. Theresa of Avila. On Wednesday 3/13 at 7pm, Joyce Donahue from Mayslake ministries will be speaking on the Eucharistic Revival. This is a great thing during Lent to focus on deepening our love for the Eucharist. Then on Thursday 3/14 at 7pm is the parish Lenten Reconciliation service. It will be a busy and blessed 4th week of Lent for our community.





Cathy's Corner—Cleansing Ourselves of Preconceived Notions

Preconceived notions almost prevented Naaman, the army commander of the king of Aram, from living a life free from leprosy. It was his wife's slave, a young girl captured in a raid on Israel, who told her mistress of a prophet so great he could cure even that devastating disease. Naaman presumed that a prophet mighty enough to effectuate such healing must be a monarch, so Naaman brought the letter from his own king requesting a cure and the standard fare of gifts to the king of Israel. However, that ruler was so horrified by the inquiry that he tore his garments in the customary gesture of shock and dismay. He presumed the king of Aram was secretly looking for a reason to instigate a confrontation since everyone knew the Israelite king did not have power over life and death.

Once Naaman did finally locate the prophet Elisha, whom the Israelite servant girl had actually been referencing, his preconceived notions kicked in again. Naaman presumed that a real prophet would put on a show with gesticulations and invocations to his god in order to bring the necessary healing. Elisha, however, did not even bother to present himself to the ailing man. Rather, he sent instructions through a third party to do nothing more extraordinary than the commonplace action of washing himself. Even worse, he was to do this in the muddy Jordan river when he had pure mountain spring waters in his own country that would have done a much better job. Whether it was his desperation to be healed, or the gentle pull on his heart of the one true God, Naaman threw aside his preconceived notions and plunged seven times in the river Jordan. And his skin became as it was when he was just a child.

As much joy as Naaman felt at the shattering of his preconceived notions was the fury the residents of Nazareth felt when Jesus shattered theirs. After all, the children of Israel were God's chosen people and they presumed they alone were beneficiaries of God's offer of salvation. Yet Jesus made it clear that the actions of the prophets demonstrate that God's mercy is universal, poured out on Gentiles as well as Jews, women as well as men. Preconceived notions are now, as they were then, dangerous to our salvation. They can bar us from obtaining the help we need for healing and wholeness from those whose ways are different from our own. They can cause us to reject ones not in our chosen religious circle and so reject the Lord himself whose mercy extends to all people. Let us, like Naaman, feel God's gentle pull on our hearts to wash away our preconceived notions in God's boundless river of loving inclusion. 2 Kgs 5:1-15ab; Ps 42: 2, 3; 43: 3, 4; Lk 4:24-30
