Welcome to March! This year is already off to a fast start. The weather has also made it seem like springtime. However, with the arrival of the month of March we do start to see the first glimmers of spring around the corner. The weather starts to brighten up and new life will begin to bloom around us. This is also the time when we start to think about the annual tradition of spring cleaning. It is a good chance for us to go through all the closets and drawers at home and begin to declutter and freshen up our homes. We also need to spring clean our lives. That is the purpose of Lent and why it coincides with springtime. It is an opportunity for us to engaging the cleaning and

purifying our heart so that we can recognize the new life of Christ springing up, just as the plants will soon be springing up. Our hearts get cluttered easily with unnecessary stuff, distractions and so many worries that weight us down. Lent allows us to unburden our hearts of the excess that we might be carrying. The Gospel for this weekend is Jesus cleaning the temple of the merchants. Jesus saw that the temple, His Father's house, was becoming dirty and defiled. There was too much other stuff going on and not enough focus on true worship of the Lord. Jesus wanted them to get back to the basics and focus on what is most important. That is exactly what Jesus still wants us to do during Lent. We must clean the temple of the Holy Spirit that is in us. The best place to start with spring cleaning of our hearts is by examining how well we are living the 10 Commandments. Cathy's Corner—Poor But Not Nameless

The rich man does not even have a name. There is no indication that he was selfish or arrogant or deceitful or mean. He was just rich. Every day he walked past a man who was not only poor, but sick and in pain as evidenced by the sores that covered his body. The poor man does have a name - Lazarus. There is no indication that he was kind or gentle or forgiving or generous. He was just poor. And when Lazarus died he was immediately swept up by the angels and carried to the choice position in the bosom of Abraham. And when the rich man died he was condemned to eternal torment in the netherworld.

Which does seem kind of unfair to the rich man whom Jesus never even bothers to name in his story to the Pharisees. But it is in fact just another scriptural example of the preferential option for the poor. Lazarus did not have to be morally righteous to live forever in heavenly comfort. The rich man did not have to be morally bankrupt to be sentenced to perpetual damnation. All he had to do was ignore the poor person right in front of his face.

Because the rich man did need to acknowledge the destitute person who was so pitiable that even the dogs would come and lick his sores. The rich man did need to even have merely given this fellow human being, made just like himself in the image and likeness of God, the scraps that fell from his table so that Lazarus would not have to constantly suffer from the aching starvation that likely ended up killing him. However, the rich man could only do that if he had bothered to look beyond himself and his entitled world to really see that dirty and broken man on his doorstep.

Perhaps it is easier for impoverished people to trust in the Lord, to be one's whose hope is the Lord because the world has turned its back on them. Maybe it is effortless for the wealthy person to rather trust in human beings, and seek one's strength only in oneself because the world has so greatly benefited them. So true the statement of Jeremiah that more torturous than all else is the human heart — who can understand it? Fortunately for us we do not need to do the Lord's work of probing the minds and testing the hearts of our sisters and brothers. We need only truly see the indigent in our midst and care for their necessities. Because all it really takes is for us to adopt God's preferential option for the poor for our roots to be ever planted firmly beside the waters of eternal life. ## <u>Caring for Creation-Water for Life</u> DID YOU KNOW:

Even though the earth is covered in water, only 2.5% of it is fresh water.

Only 1% of the world's water is usable to us because most of the Fresh water is locked in the polar ice caps or so deep beneath the earth that it is too costly to bring that water to the surface.

#### We use most of the water here in the USA.

Many families in the world do not have access to clean drinking water. In fact, here in the USA many places are suffering from water shortages, while other places like Flint Michigan are still suffering from their contaminated drinking water.

This third week of Lent let's fast from overusing water. Here are some ways your family can support this cause:

#### **BE AWARE!**

Every time you turn on the faucet, drop a penny, or bean, into a cup or bowl in your table. At the end of the week, talk about how much water you and your family use. Think of ways you can save water in your home. In the following week, repeat the procedure and see if your family used less water. Continue in this manner until Easter Sunday.

#### PRAY!

Offer in prayer those who do not have clean water. Pray for all people to consider our natural resources as precious gifts from God, and to use them in ways that sustain the environment, not hurt it.

#### DONATE!

Consider a donation to the food pantry with the counting tools used in your experiment to determine how much you will donate.
