



Cathy's Corner— Being Saved in the Saving

Who released whom? Did the jailer release Paul and Silas or did they release him? It did not take long for Paul to cause a stir in Philippi and land himself in jail. He just casually, out of annoyance really, exorcised a slave girl possessed by a spirit that predicted the future who was following them around for days, shouting that Paul and his companions were slaves of the Most High God. Needless to say, her owners were none too pleased about the profit they lost from selling her fortune-telling in the marketplace. The next thing Paul and Silas knew they were brought before the magistrate on a claim of disturbing the city - and, ironically enough, for being Jews - and locked up securely in the innermost cell of the prison.

Perhaps recalling the words of Jesus to his disciples that he would send them the Advocate, who would convict the world in regard to sin and righteousness and condemnation, they prayed and sang hymns to God. Sure enough, the doors of the prison were thrown open and the chains of all were loosened. Still, it is not clear whether Paul and Silas would have been able to maneuver their way out of the bowels of the unfamiliar hold in the pitch black. Even the jailer needed a light to illuminate his way as he rushed in and fell down before the two. It seems likely, then, that it was he who released Paul and Silas.

Yet, at the same time, Paul and Silas were releasing him from slavery to the ruler of this world. Certainly, the jailer could have converted because of the earthquake that erupted after everyone in the prison heard arising from the darkness the prayers and hymns of Paul and Silas. But he was filled with so much fear of a worldly ruler that taking his own life was a better option than facing the consequences of allowing the prisoners to escape on his watch. Perhaps, then, it was the overwhelming shock and gratitude that Paul and Silas, even as they were unchained, were not attempting to flee. Maybe Paul's calling out "do no harm to yourself; we are all here," made him recognize what it truly meant to be saved. Likely it was little of both, knitted together by the invisible hand of the Advocate sent by Jesus.

Indeed, it is so often the truth that the ones we reach out to save, save us as well. The ones we release from the chains of neediness and despair by our loving care release us at the same time from our own prisons of isolation and purposelessness. And sometimes, like the jailer, we do not realize we are even in need of salvation. It can take a cataclysmic event, or simply the voice of someone calling out in our darkness the words we need to hear, to realize it.

Certainly, the foundations of this world shake with disasters both naturally and maliciously created. And there are voices crying out to us from the darkness of the poverty and sorrow that inevitably results. But the Advocate who convicts those who oppress their sisters and brothers as she defends those who work to set them free guides us to the place where all will find salvation, whether we are the ones reaching out a hand in compassionate care or those grasping that hand to receive it. The place where we are all released with each other into the freedom we can only find in our God.

Questions of the Week:

Question for Children: Jesus helps us be strong in our faith. When do you need to be really strong in faith?
