



Cathy's Corner—There is No "I" in Banquet

Seems a bit odd that those individuals who were invited to the great banquet Jesus was talking about at one of the many dinners he attended in Luke's Gospel made excuses not to go. Who doesn't want to attend a wonderful meal at no cost to themselves? The field that one person purchased wasn't going anywhere. The evaluation of the oxen already procured by another could definitely wait. And being newly married as was the third certainly doesn't preclude anyone from indulging in a delicious feast.

Perhaps the answer lies in the commonality of all the responses, the emphasis on "I." After all, the great dinner is really a "we," isn't it? It is a mix of whatever people the host decided to invite. Who knows if you will be seated next to someone not as educated as yourself, or someone who has a sad story to share or someone who forgot his wallet and needs to borrow some money for the coat check. And so, dining in the Kingdom of God is a "we." As Jesus illustrated in his parable, that includes the poor and the crippled, the blind and the lame. It includes whoever the master of the house asks in to taste that luscious feast, as unappealing as they may seem to the other guests. Because all those invited are one Body in Christ, as St. Paul says, who must in all aspects of their lives have the same regard for one another. Indeed, each individual is graced with different gifts specifically so that they can be exercised for the entire body in all its diversity. For how can one minister or teach or exhort or contribute or be hospitable or show mercy alone? The opportunity to share those gifts, to tend to the needs of our sisters and brothers in the way we are specifically gifted to do, is itself the invitation to the banquet. Is itself the acceptance of everyone on the guest list. Is itself living as a "we" rather than an "I."

When self-interest, in whatever form that takes, precludes us from answering that invitation, we have turned our back on the chance to partake in the heavenly banquet. We are, in fact, starving ourselves of the sustenance given by our God that we may rejoice in hope and endure in affliction only because we are at the table with one another. The Good News is that we receive these invitations all the time. Let us all the time accept them.
