

Cathy's Corner—What Can Be Accomplished with Faith the Size of a Mustard Seed

In 1889, an Italian immigrant landed in New York. She and her six female companions had no knowledge of the English language. Upon arrival, they were told that the place they had intended to stay was no longer available. The seven women were also informed that they should return to Italy, because America was not kind to Italians. Undaunted, Mother Frances Xavier Cabrini, along with her missionary sisters, chose to stay in this unfamiliar and unfriendly land. She had been sent by Pope Leo XIII to minister to the great needs of the Italian immigrants in the United States and that is what she intended to do.

The first naturalized American citizen to be canonized, Mother Cabrini left an indelible mark on our own Chicago, where she came in 1899 to care for first-generation Italians, many of whom were impoverished and struggling to feed their families. But her love for the little ones of God, the ones despised and ignored by those with earthly power, did not end there. Despite her fear of water, she crossed the Atlantic Ocean more than 30 times, caring for the poor, the sick, the uneducated and the abandoned. By the time she joined the saints in heaven, she had founded 67 hospitals, orphanages and schools throughout the world that ministered to whomever was in need, regardless of nationality.

Indeed, from childhood Mother Cabrini longed to bring Christ's love throughout the globe. She had from the start the faith the apostles asked Jesus for, perhaps in the beginning only the size of a mustard seed, but that was more than enough. Forever to live in a fragile and delicate state of health, she was refused admission for that reason to the religious order which had trained her to be a teacher. She chose to forgive that injustice, instead drawing a group of women to herself and founding the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus to care for poor children in schools and hospitals. In her own ministry she always sought justice, indeed she loved justice, and so was filled with wisdom and the Holy Spirit so to move the mountains that impeded her mission of compassion, which at one point even entailed her filing a lawsuit against a corrupt contractor and enlisting her sisters to complete the project.

Throughout it all, she remained a gentle woman who still never shied away from confronting the princes of this world to defend the lowly. Tireless in her care, even as she was breathing her last she was preparing Christmas candy for the local children in her room at Lincoln Park's Columbus Hospital, one of the many she had established. May we follow in her footsteps of love and care to the hungry and the destitute, and most especially to those who come to our borders longing only for peace and safety. Questions of the Week:

Question for Children: Name one talent or gift that God has given you and tell how you have used it.

Question for Youth: Name three talents that you have. How can you use these talents in the next week to make someone's life better?

Question for Adults: Using Jesus' parable as your starting point, describe in your own words how you are using your own gifts to enrich the reign of God.

Activities of the Week

The Gospel today asks us to use our gifts and risk everything for the sake of the Gospel. Give a cardboard circle to each member of the family. Instruct each person to write his or her name on a circle and then to pass the circle to the person on the left. This person should write on the circle one gift that the family member has. If the children are too young to write, do this orally while someone in the family writes. Take time to affirm the talents you see in one another. Talk about ways to use your gifts to help build God's Kingdom.

Did You Know?

. . . that there are seven gifts of the Holy Spirit? They are wisdom, understanding, counsel, knowledge fortitude, piety, and fear of the Lord (which is also called wonder and awe). When one is confirmed, the bishop or priest says. "Receive the Gift of the Holy Spirit," as he anoints the one being confirmed.

Gratitude, Generosity and Stewardship

In his Encyclical, Laudato Si': On Care for Our Common Home, Pope Francis encourages us to imitate God's generosity, calling for an attitude of "...gratitude and gratuitousness, a recognition that the world is God's loving gift, and that we are called quietly to imitate his generosity in selfsacrifice and good works."

Pope Francis further explains, "One expression of this attitude is when we stop and give thanks to God before and after meals. I ask all believers to return to this beautiful and meaningful custom. That moment of blessing, however brief, reminds us of our dependence on God for life; it strengthens our feeling of gratitude for the gifts of creation; it acknowledges those who by their labours provide us with these goods; and it reaffirms our solidarity with those in greatest need." (LS 222, 227).

We show our respect and gratitude to the Creator by our stewardship and recognition of his bountiful creation as a precious gift requiring our care.
