



Cathy's Corner—Temples in Need of Purification

Maccabee in Hebrew means "hammer," which was the nickname given to Judas, son of Mattathias, and hence the title of two of the books in the Old Testament. An appropriate name it was since Judas successfully led the Jewish revolt against the Seleucid tyrant Antiochus IV Epiphanes, who had desecrated the altar of holocausts in Jerusalem with a pagan god. Judas and his brothers took back the temple, purified the sanctuary and rededicated it for true worship of the Lord of Hosts.

Less than two hundred years later Jesus of Nazareth also entered Jerusalem and took back the temple, this time from the Jewish leaders themselves, who had desecrated it with a different kind of pagan god, that of money. It is interesting to note that the vendors operating out of the covered market that ran along three sides of the temple mount, called the Royal Stoa, were actually doing nothing that was wrong or illegal. Indeed, King Herod the Great, who built his temple on the original site of that of Solomon, intended that this part of the huge plaza would be dedicated to mercantile activity as it did not compromise the worship space.

But God became one of us to proclaim a new way to be one with God. And so Jesus purified the sanctuary by purging all who used it for their own gain, legal as those means may have been, and rededicated it by teaching what is in fact true worship of God, which mandates putting people before profit. More importantly, his claiming of this holy place announced to all that he is the cornerstone, he is the true Temple, and through him God is present to everyone, if they but believe.

In Luke's Gospel he does this not by overturning tables or fashioning a whip of cords, but by announcing with authority what God requires of us to be God's own people and by then continuing to teach and preach and model that in the temple area day after day. Our churches can only reflect true worship of this Temple that is Christ Jesus if to them all are welcomed with mercy and love, if in them praise and thanksgiving are offered to God alone, and if from them stream disciples who with joy proclaim and practice the Good News of the Lord Jesus Christ. Otherwise, ours are temples in name only, desperately in need of divine purification.

Did You Know?


