We have been inundated with funerals over the last year. Since I started here last July, I have personally presided at 58 funerals. That does not include the very large number that Fr. Greg did and now Fr. Rob has had his first funeral here. Also, the deacons have done many chapel services at local funeral homes. Altogether, OLMC has had over 100 funerals in the last 15 months. That is a staggering number and gives us all pause to reflect on the brevity of life and the pain that comes from losing a loved one. The month of November is a time for us to reflect and remember all those who have gone before us. We just celebrated the All Saints Day, which is when we remember the saints of our church who have gone before and continue to serve as a good example and intercessors for us. We also celebrated All Souls Day on November 2 with a beautiful candlelight liturgy. It was on that day that

we remembered all the dead, all those people who had been part of our story and life and had left lasting marks on us. I remember the lessons learned, both good and bad, from my parents and grandparents and other family members. Those memories shape the person I am today. We are who we are because of the people who went before us. As a community, we are who we are because of those 100 plus funerals and the lives of those people who were in some way part of this community. As we journey through the month of November, let us spend some time reflecting on those individuals who have shaped us personally and communally. We give thanks to God for the good and the bad that makes us who we are. Please hold all our beloved deceased in your prayers this month.

The Gospel this weekend tells us "The greatest among you must be your servant." This is a lesson that we need to continually try to incorporate in our own hearts. Too often, we can get self-obsessed with power and thinking that we are the most important person. Jesus reminds us that true power and greatness is in our ability to serve and make the lives of others better. How are we being people of service to others?

Cathy's Corner—**The Souls That Are in the Hands of God**

November in the natural world brings us reminders of the inevitability of death, death of the leaves that once covered our trees, death of the daylight that used to bring us warmth, death of the flowers that brought us such vibrant color. November in our liturgical world reminds us that this death we see, in our own lives as well as in the world around us, is not a real death, not a punishment, not an affliction. This perceived death is the door to eternal life, offered by God to all.

Because All Souls means just what it says – all souls. All souls that belonged to all the people that have gone before us in the death that our faith teaches us leads to everlasting life. Even those souls that believe in a different sort of afterlife. Buddhist souls and Hindu souls. Or those souls that really do not know what to believe. Agnostic souls. Or those souls that believe there is no afterlife. Ancient Sadducee souls. Or those souls that do not have any faith. Atheist souls. This is a day for all who have died and all who will die, which of course is everyone now and once living.

Because only our God knows who is one of the faithful departed. When that God became human to show us how to become divine, our God said that no one who comes to God will be rejected. Indeed, that same God become human died not just for good people but for sinners, for the ungodly. For all souls. Because there is only one God, no matter what name a soul uses to call out in supplication. And the souls of the just are in that God's hands, no matter what they looked like in life, what language they spoke, what prayers they offered. Those are souls in peace, free of torment, shining with the blessing of eternal life that some day we ourselves will know, if only we trust. Scripture denies the desperation of death, heralding instead the hope of immortality. And that hope does not disappoint. The Word of God is the promise that the trees will again bud, the sun will still warm us, a rainbow of flowers will once more bloom. It is the promise that we will be raised with Christ Jesus, that we will shine like gold and dart about like sparks, resting with the holy ones in everlasting peace. Life as we know it is not ended but rather changed. Temporary life becomes eternal life. Only the foolish would call that death.
