

Perhaps one of the things that God hates the most is indifference. This guest would have been given what he needed but choice to not use it. It is sad when a person wastes the talents and gifts given in life. Sometimes, not doing something is worse than doing something. We call those sins of omission. What might be the areas in life where we are not trying? Are we wasting a gift given to us? Are we guilty of a sin of omission where we had the opportunity to help but did not?

# **Tree Sponsorship Opportunity**


We'd like to replenish the trees on campus that we've lost to storms or disease over the years.

#### Cathy's Corner—A Council Waiting to Bloom

Angelo Giuseppe Roncalli, born to a family of sharecroppers, lived most of his ordained life in relative obscurity in places like Bulgaria and Greece and Turkey, in the latter two representing powerless Catholic minorities and mostly being ignored by both those governments and the Vatican. So he was more surprised than anyone at his election to pope in 1958 after the death of Pius XII. To be fair, he was a compromise candidate because after the 12<sup>th</sup> ballot the cardinals still could not agree. At 76 he was the oldest pope elected in 200 years and really expected to say a few Masses, bless a few babies and die quietly in a few years consistent with his virtually anonymous past.

Surprise again, even to Pope John XXIII himself, that it popped into his head to convene the Second Vatican Council, which opened in Rome on October 11, 1962. In announcing his intent, he said, "The Church is not a museum of antiques but a living garden of life." Vatican II was the only council in the history of the church that was called not to crush some heresy or correct some faulty doctrine, but called, in the first words of the first document created, *Sacrosanctum Concilium*, from a "desire to impart an ever increasing vigor to the Christian life of the faithful... to strengthen whatever can help to call the whole of (hu)mankind into the household of the Church."

This, of course, is not an endeavor to be undertaken alone, but only in community with each other, working side by side and recognizing what each has to offer. As St. Pope John XXIII stated, "We were all made in God's image, and thus, we are all Godly alike." Jesus told his detractors that a kingdom divided cannot stand and house will fall against house. It is only by gathering everyone together that the household of the Church can stand. The Second Vatican Council began that process but there is still a long way to go. Like the Prophet Joel, there are some that believe we live in a day of darkness and gloom and ruin is coming.

Still St. Pope John XXIII himself, at his address at the opening of the Council, criticized the "prophets of doom" who "in these modern times see nothing but prevarication and ruin." He began the Council with a prayer to the Holy Spirit that was repeated every day it was in session. As John XXIII stated, "It is not the Gospel that changes; it is we who begin to understand it better." The Council document *Lumen Gentium* reminds us, "At all times and in every race, God has given welcome to whosoever fears (God) and does what is right." Good Pope John believed this of our God and trusted in the Spirit. And there is no demon of hate and division that can conquer that combination.
