

Cathy's Corner—Finding God in the Fire

The dry spell began in the summer of 1871, stubbornly refusing to be dampened so that by early fall the Midwest was a veritable tinderbox. On the evening of October 8th, dry winds and no rain ignited not one, but three distinct and deadly fires, in the neighboring states of Illinois and Wisconsin. While the Great Chicago Fire is the most famous of the trio, the deadliest was the one in Peshtigo, Wisconsin, with a death toll of between 1,500 and 2,500 as compared to the 300 lives lost in Chicago. It took less than two hours to incinerate the entire town and the people that lived there. In what is now Champion, Wisconsin, a third fire raged, although some sources consider that an extension of the Peshtigo fire, concluding that it leapt across Green Bay to devour more lives and more land and more livestock with its scorching hunger.

Like the Israelites returning from the Babylonian exile to the holy city of Jerusalem decimated by their captors, perhaps those that remained felt that God had brought this disaster upon them, had at the very least turned a deaf ear to their torment. And yet, there were the miracles. In Chicago, the parish church of Patrick and Catherine O'Leary, memorialized in story and song as the owners of the cow who started the famous blaze, was in the line of the fire, literally. The pastor, Fr. Arnold Damen, was preaching a mission in Brooklyn, New York, but hearing of the crisis at home, prayed to Our Lady of Perpetual Help to protect the church. The wind shifted, and Holy Family Church, which still stands today, was spared. It is the second-oldest Catholic church in Chicago and one of just a few buildings to have survived the fire.

In Champion, Sister Adele Brise, who 12 years earlier almost to the day had seen the first of three visions of Our Lady, Queen of Heaven, prayed in the chapel built upon that same land as the inferno advanced, encouraging people from the surrounding area to join her in a structure made only of wood. The refugees crammed inside, while some carried a statue of the Blessed Mother in procession around the fenced perimeter throughout the night. The flames scorched the fence's paint but came no farther. And near dawn, rain cascaded from the sky, extinguishing the fire completely. Nothing was left standing in the entire area natural or man-made but that wooden chapel built in 1861 which bore in French the inscription "Our Lady of Good Help, pray for us."

Even in Peshtigo, where so few were left to even tell their stories, the pastor of St. Mary's Catholic Church, Fr. Peter Pernin, as he watched in horror the roaring flames approach, grabbed the tabernacle with the reserved sacrament and raced to the river, submerging it in an attempt to save it from destruction. However, even those who jumped in the water to escape had to repeatedly immerse themselves because the flames were burning anything exposed to the air. Days later, the tabernacle was found floating downriver, completely unblemished from a fire so hot that it turned the sand in the street to glass.

And so, in the midst of what seemed like the full force of the enemy of all that is good was the mercy of our God, was the intercession of the Blessed Mother, honored today as Our Lady of the Rosary. As Jesus told his disciples when they returned from their missionary journeys, "Blessed are the eyes that see what you see." Blessed are the eyes that recognize the miracles in the misery, the mercy in the madness, the love of our God in the worst demons and disasters that can be thrown at us. Because with those eyes we can see that our God is never punishing us, but always accompanying us, and listening, ever listening, as we cry out to keep the flames at bay.
