

PRAY TO END ABORTION

Cathy's Corner— A Body in Need of Heal-

It certainly feels like the Body of Christ is in need of some serious medical treatment. Division, both political and ecclesial, pulls us apart limb from limb. Climate change is wreaking havoc on us from all sides and disease physical and emotional is literally sickening us even to death. And the places Pope Francis has termed "field hospitals," our churches, continue to have fewer and fewer resources for effective outreach to those in need. Where can we find those holy ones Paul is talking to the Ephesians about who will do the work of ministry? Where are those Apostles and prophets and evangelists to equip them when found? Where are those pastors and teachers called to pre-

serve the unity of the Spirit?

Maybe we need to look in the mirror. The day is long gone, arguably never actually existed, when that work is to be relegated to our priests and our sisters, our deacons and our monks, with just a little bit of help from us when we can find some time. St. Paul reminds us that grace is given to each one of us, that we have all been called to bear with one another through love and so build up the Body of Christ, no matter how we currently see our role in the world. The early church was also a field hospital, taking seriously their role as the hands and feet of the Divine Physician, who spent his time with sinners who needed his mercy rather than saints who believed they did

And those first Christian communities had no grand cathedrals or even simple chapels to call their own; the faithful gathered in people's homes to listen to the words of Jesus and to share with each other the Body and Blood of Christ. They bore with one another through love, with humility and gentleness, strengthening each to live as ones called by Christ, whatever strange turn in their journey that would precipitate. Likely the last thing Matthew thought he would be doing with his life was following Jesus when he was sitting at his customs post working for the Roman Empire and cheating his fellow Jews.

Indeed, Pope Francis has also said there is no saint without a past and no sinner without a future. We are the holy ones Paul is talking about, no matter what ignoble debility we feel that we bear. Now more than ever, we must strive to preserve the unity of the Spirit through the bond of peace, the true peace that emanates from wounds that have been healed and hearts that have been warmed through the work of each and every one of us striving to live in a manner worthy of the call we have received. Let us partake of the healing tonic of mercy and forgiveness that is always offered us by the Divine Physician, then turn around and offer that same tonic, even if it is just a small sip, to some other member of the Body of Christ. The field hospital is ready. Let the healing begin.


