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

"You duped me, O Lord, and I let myself be duped;" Jeremiah 20:7 This is the opening line of the first reading today. No one likes to be fooled. Cathy's Corner— The Pharisees and the Theological Virtues

It is not impossible that the Pharisees being lambasted by Jesus are the reason we have the very first Christian document ever written: the First Letter of Paul to the Thessalonians. From the beginning of the first century until about twenty years after Paul's letter was written in probably 50 CE, many Pharisees were engaged in a robust missionary campaign throughout Gentile communities. Accordingly, synagogues were to be found in places like Thessalonica, the capital of the Roman province of Macedonia and a vital economic, commercial and political center in Paul's world.

Indeed, the apostle chose to evangelize in Thessalonica after he was expelled from Philippi, which was about 100 miles away, rather than lingering in closer cities because they did not, in fact, contain a synagogue, the place Paul would choose to begin his proselytizing. With the converts in that city, Paul would develop a deep affection. Not surprisingly, he also got himself into deep trouble, as his powerful preaching caused a riot to break out. Paul and his companions were thus unceremoniously ejected from Thessalonica as well. Timothy returned, however, and reported back to Paul the strong faith that was thriving in that Christian community, but also some misunderstandings that had cropped up.

Likely just a few months after Paul had left his beloved Thessalonians, then, he sent them a letter, the first writing in what would eventually be called the New Testament. In the earliest mention of what are now called "the theological virtues," Paul wished to affirm "their work of faith and labor of love and endurance in hope of our Lord Jesus Christ." Paul himself had modeled those virtues for them and that was no small part of why they turned from worship of idols to serve the living and true God - recognizing, of course, as Paul did, the primacy of the power of the Holy Spirit.

Paul was, in every way, the antithesis of the Pharisee he himself had once been. Many were, as Jesus called out, religious leaders who failed in their responsibility to effectively lead their followers to the kingdom of heaven by falsely interpreting God's commandments and hypocritically refusing to practice what they preached. For such as these, Jesus hurled his harshest condemnations. Because they were in truth leading their followers not to eternal life, but to everlasting punishment, Gehenna.

A sobering thought for all of us, who every day are called to model for someone we encounter a life grounded in the theological virtues, whether for our children, our co-workers, our volunteer group, our worship community. There is a communal aspect to all actions we take, and we who profess faith in the living and true God must exhibit our faith by our works, labor with love for others and endure in the hope that we will experience eternal life. Because the kingdom of heaven can never be reached alone. And everlasting punishment yawns when by our actions we encourage others to imitate our selfishness and conceit.

But the power of the Holy Spirit is all around us. Through faith in our God we can even build on foundations created by false teachers, as Paul did on the communities created by the Pharisees, bringing to our world faith, hope and love, being for our sisters and brothers the hands and feet of the one who through whom we all are saved. And giving thanks always for each person we meet, who afford us yet another opportunity to make happen.



Questions of the Week:

Question for Children: Jesus tells us that we each called to follow him. What is hard for you to do to follow Jesus?
