

Our ambassador is a voice for local business throughout the region. Bringing light upon, and a bigger picture focus to topics of concern, representing at local, state and federal levels of government






02/ be sustainable

The message is clear, and it is one that

West Vic Business has carried forward since the pandemic. Regional areas need to improve livability through social and recreational development to increase revenue across sectors, and ensure sustainability long term. Be it private or government based investments, precinct development focusing on these two elements is crucial to the long term sustainability of our cities and towns throughout the Wimmera Mallee. In the chart opposite, figures represent the importance of impacting factors for young singles and couples. As age increases and family dynamics shift, so do the percentile focus. On what end of the circumfrance a town or city invests in its developments, will contribute significantly to population trends and declining or increasing spending habits







haven community hub

As most are aware, vacancies exist across industry sectors that at present, are difficult to near impossible to fill. After contact by multiple employers attempting to attract candidates from outside of the region, who reported encountering congested and in many instances near or exceeding capacity at schools across the city of Horsham, West Vic Business, working alongside member Haven Community Inc., identified Haven Community Hub & Reserve as the most logical and easily expandable education, sporting, social and potential retail precinct for the increasingly popular area

The only community hub in Horsham South, a considered and forward-thinking planning process is being encouraged at a local government level, with advocacy and future planning meetings occurring across the last half of 2023 with the Chief of Staff of the Minister for Education, Regional Directors of the Department of Education, and the local leadership team at Horsham West & Haven Primary School, Haven Campus. Potential to expand positions and attract additional students at the Haven Campus and community hub through the develop of a bush school and kinder program, is being suggested as an opportunity to ease pressure across the city, and create an incredible marketing opportunity for our city and region





roberts place

The development of a member based hospitality industry sector network has commenced, with a focus on a pre-emptive and anticipatory approach to encouraging strategic leasing, and building of a hospitality and dining precinct in Roberts Place, Horsham

Identifying vacancies, garnering input from existing businesses and future movements and/or willingness to relocate and reimagine, this project is key to reinvigorating the cities social scene, and providing a drawcard for existing and new residents alike


Meetings with business owners, potential new business owners and local government, all work to ensure that a precinct that has longevity and sustainability is established. If successful, Roberts Place will provide a platform for thriving hospitality and complimentary boutique style businesses, encompassing a communal outdoor dining strip that increases revenue across the precinct, helping to reinvigorate the central activity district, and become a major drawcard for the city

river precinct

Rezoning and planning along the Wimmera River to enable the development of waterfront business opportunities in the social, recreational and hospitality sectors, is being pursued with various departments of local government

Activating points of interest along the full stretch, and both sides of the Wimmera River will be key in avoiding congestion, moving foot traffic, increasing use of gathering spaces and outdoor activities, and building another incredible tourism precinct that helps drive our local economy

Concepts presented to date include the development of a family precinct that encompasses Adventure Island, a cafe and water sports hire business adjacent and upon the marina bay area, fountain spouts centrally located in the bay for daytime watersports and night time visual interest through lighting and projected water surface images of native fish, yabby and local platypus climbing out of water onto riverbanks






lake precinct

Gathering and contemplation spaces, exercise paths, surrounding accommodation, hospitality, events, tourism and sporting developments all move beyond the traditional view point and cautious approach to investing in the development of a revenue treasure, such as Green Lake and the surrounding lake precinct

The ability to attract and halt substantial passing traffic to become a destination, rather than a break in between journey's end, is key in building our city and region moving forward. Learning from the incredible success and transformation of other cities and towns through the redevelopment of water ways, Horsham is sitting adjacent to a precinct which could effectively alter the direction of our city, capturing and redirecting impressive foot traffic and driving it into our city and businesses, helping to attract and retain youth and young families

Key stakeholder meetings and presentations to local government, water and catchment boards has continued throughout 2023, with an effort to ensure that West VIc Business's conceptual plan for the development of The Yacht Club at Green Lake and the surrounding lake area, becomes a priority for council and future funding opportunities #lake life means new life for business

West Vic Business have been successful in submitting a grant application for the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal's Drought Preparedness Program, that has delivered near \$50,000 to create and deliver a town strategy program

The year long program will bring together representatives from shire councils, action groups, progress associations, community groups and business groups from across north west Victoria, helping to develop strategic plans for their towns and cities

The program encourages participants to look at their town as a business in its own right and strategise accordingly. Teaming again with Spark Strategy to facilitate and lead the program, West Vic Business will commence marketing and registrations for the program in the coming month





shop your town gift card program

The Shop Your Town gift card program continues to be a driver of revenue to member businesses across sectors, with recent funding from Business Victoria's Flood Recovery Grant injecting a further \$20,000 into the program

Partnering with Horsham Rural City Council and Centre for Participation, West Vic Business will combine to deliver much needed support to member businesses as part of the Horsham Christmas Extravaganza


A unified voice for regional business, the Victorian Regional Chamber Alliance, brings together business groups and chambers of commerce from across the state



A seemingly perfect storm of financial impacting factors is having a profound effect on regional businesses, with increasing energy and utility costs, difficulties in securing stock and products via normal supply chains, the cost of services, materials and freight, all compounded by relentless inflation and rising interest rates

Add to this, the need and push from employees, seeking higher wages to combat similar personal financial crisis through cost of living increases, and you have pressure building from both sides. Sectors that have been particularly hard hit are hospitality, retail, service and manufacturing. With an almost blanket issue of attracting and retaining staff across industry sectors, this too is placing undue stress and financial burdens on many SME's across our region

With many considering either selling or closing the doors, or alternatively, seeking any means possible to cut costs, what is the impact on small business advisory and support services such as business groups and chambers of commerce? There has been a definite loss of membership across the state and country. The need to seek financial support for these crucial services, and what is undeniably the most trusted and accessible conduit between business and government, is a must in 2024. And as we leave 2023 behind us, West Vic Business remains strong, financially impacted but secure, and this in itself is a true success (financial report available upon request)
