The Third Sunday of Advent - Gospel Reflection

Readings: Isaiah 35:1-6a, 10. Psalm 146:6-7, 8-9, 9-10. James 5:7-10. Matthew 11:2-11.

The Advent season takes a decided turn this week to focus attention on the impending nativity of Jesus. Opening the Word today reveals the reason why we eagerly await Christmas.

In the first reading, Isaiah explains it with images of nature's beauty. Exultant lands, blooming flowers, fertile regions ("Carmel and Sharon") all speak to "the splendor of Our God." So too the blind seeing, the deaf hearing, the lame leaping, the mute singing – these otherwise impossible transformations contribute to the "joy and gladness" at the Lord's coming.

The reason for people's hope will soon be realized: "Here is your God," the One alone who can help by coming to save us (responsorial psalm).

That "advent" of the Savior dominates Matthew's Gospel. While the Jewish (or Jewish-Christian) community to whom he wrote expected a Messiah, the concept lacked clarity in terms of who it would be, how He would appear, or what He would do.

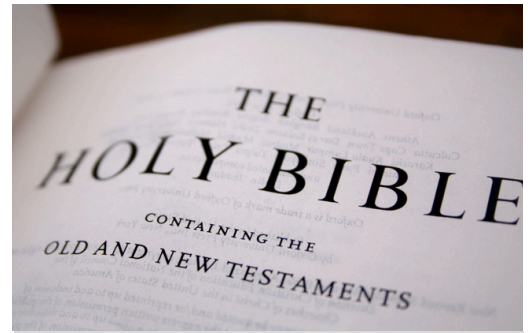
The disciples of John pose the identity question on behalf of the Baptist. They ask Jesus outright: "Are you the One who is to come?" Later in Matthew's narrative, Peter will confess the answer (Matthew 16:16), but the high priest Caiaphas still inquires about it (Matthew 26:63).

Jesus' response to the question deftly deflects any identification that would impose belief. Instead, He respects the disciples' freedom and invites them to decide whether He is "the One," based on what they "hear and see" in terms of the miracles He has wrought. While His resume of restorative acts speaks for itself, He nevertheless wants disciples to decide for themselves and "blesses" those who are not scandalized by Him ("who take no offense at Me").

Publicly Jesus reveres the Baptist as "more than a prophet" and avows John's unique place ("none greater") in the history of salvation. But the newcomer who appeared by the Jordan River where John was baptizing, the miraculous healer who performed the works of the Christ throughout Galilee and Judea – this Jesus is, indeed, the Messiah. True believers know this – they need not look for another!

Nevertheless, the counsel in today's second reading offers perennial wisdom: "Be patient ... until the coming of the Lord." At that time, James refers to an imminent second coming of Jesus, which did not happen. Still, Jesus' coming remains "at hand" in a true spiritual sense, every time He is received in the Eucharist and each year that His birth is celebrated at Christmas.

In anticipation of that wondrous historical moment, we would do well to follow James' advice to "not complain," but to "make our hearts firm" in the sure and certain hope that the Messiah is coming to be with us.

Do You Get It?

This Week's Readings at Mass

- ▶ Isaiah 35:1-6, 10 • Israel's deliverance
- ▶ James 5:7-10 • Patience
- ▶ Matthew 11:2-11 • Christ's witness to John

After baptizing the crowds who came out to hear him preach in the wilderness, John the Baptist was thrown into jail by Herod. Herod was offended when John called out his adultery with his brother's wife and "all the evil things Herod had done" (Lk 3:19). The age-old practice of the powerful imprisoning the righteous played out again.

We may be puzzled why John is uncertain in this gospel passage about Jesus' identity. Weren't they cousins? Didn't John tell the crowds that Jesus was the Lamb of God when he baptized him? Didn't he tell them that Jesus was the one for whom he was preparing the way? Why the uncertainty now?

John's uncertainty about Jesus mirrored the questions that many Jews had about him. They were expecting a Messiah who would overthrow the Roman occupiers of their day. They were expecting a king who would rule their nation with great power and subdue all their enemies. They expected a king-military hero. Jesus' way of acting in the world and the company he kept wasn't what the Jews were expecting in a Savior. Yes, he was doing deeds of amazing power, but he was also hanging out with sinners, eating with tax collectors, and talking with women in public (gasp!). He also wasn't treating the rich and the powerful with special respect. In short, he was a mystery to many. So it's not surprising then that John is unsure just who this Jesus was turning out to be.

By telling John's disciples that John could decide for himself who Jesus was by his actions, Jesus trusted John would

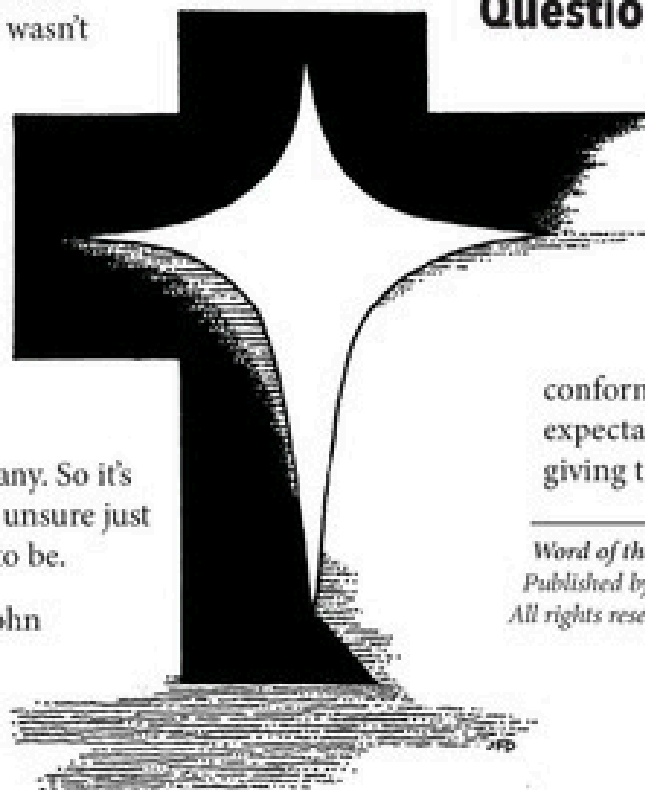
"get it." After all, John certainly knew the Old Testament scriptures well and would have recognized the parallels between what Jesus was doing—giving sight to the blind, healing the deaf and the lame, and proclaiming good news to the poor—and the promise from the prophet Isaiah of the wonders God would do.?
