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5th Sunday of Easter - Gospel Reflection

Readings: Acts 14:21-27; Psalm 145:8-9, 10-11, 12-13; Revelation 21:1-5; John 13:31-33, 34-35

The small believing community launched through Jesus' preaching and teaching is booming rapidly. Paul and the other apostles are amazed at its rapid rise from its few Jerusalem connections.

The apostles realize it is due to the gentiles' conversion. Yet the apostles and early converts are astonished at how worldwide the growth is becoming. All believe deeply it is God's action that is causing this phenomenon.

This expanse is alluded to supernaturally in Revelation's last scene. Heaven and earth pass away, and a new heaven and new earth arise in its place. Embracing the whole of creation, the reign of God is definitively established.

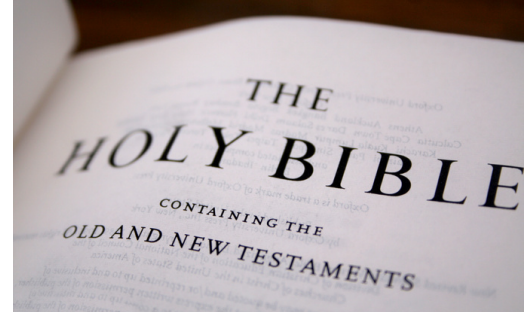
Remember the coveted and enthusiastically desired toys under last year's Christmas tree. Where are they now? Gone, lost, broken or replaced by yet another sought after "must have." Creation delights in newness, but it dims quickly in the wake of recurrent new dawns. Today's readings clearly remind us that certain God-given gifts should never become lost, grow stale or fade.

At Easter, the newly baptized become new disciples in the community and their presence adds newness and freshness. At the Last Supper, Jesus defines a new way for all his followers to love others. He tells his disciples, then and now, to love others in the same way that he loves them. Each disciple needs to learn what that means personally.

This is why Jesus calls his request a commandment. He recognizes the difficulty of loving another. However, Jesus hopes they recognize that no matter the sin, Jesus' love for his Father's creation makes him ever ready to pardon and give another chance. He willingly offers forgiveness instead of punishment every time. Why? Because Jesus' love motivates him to save and not condemn. When creation admits sin, Jesus removes it with his limitless mercy. His love for each is powerful enough to want no one to perish.

Despite Jesus' display of his love for all, some followers still use ethnic slurs against others. Some pigeonhole others who are different because of how they pray or look. And it prevails today. At Easter, because of Jesus' death and resurrection, the Church dares to preach a new way for creation to live. Easter witnesses Jesus freely giving to everyone the same ending—salvation!

The Church reminds all that the best way to preach is to live what we believe. A classic hymn says, "They will know we are Christians by our love." Pope Saint Paul VI reminds preachers and hearers alike that witnessing, not eloquence, is the best form of preaching. Of course, possessing both qualities can help all followers construct a better world. The Church has Jesus' promise of help.

The priest who blew up his own church

This story has so many fascinating chapters, we have to tell it in 2 parts!

If you scroll through the life story of Father Albert Braun, OFM, you'll wonder how such a life could be real—and not just a storyline from a movie!

By the time he died at the age of 93, Fr. Braun had accomplished more than seems possible in one lifetime. His work spanned the globe, from his ministry among the Mescalero Apache in New Mexico to his service as a chaplain in not one, but two World Wars.

Born to German immigrant parents in Los Angeles in 1889, John William "Bud" Braun was not the most typical candidate for the priesthood. As a child, he was mischievous, short-tempered, and a bit of a prankster. "I've been in trouble all my life," he would later laugh.

When he turned up at a Franciscan high school preparatory seminary in Santa Barbara, he was accepted. But they told him he was too stubborn to be a priest.

Defying expectations once again, he persevered, professed solemn vows in 1912, and was ordained in 1915. He was assigned to the Mescalero Apache in southern New Mexico, a rugged outpost of 720 square miles with a decaying church.

Though he shared no common language with the people of the reservation, Fr. Braun threw himself into the work. He learned all about the Apache people and traveled from one end of the reservation to the other, often on horseback, accompanied by Eric, his native interpreter. The people loved this enthusiastic, hardworking priest; as numbers swelled in the little chapel, Fr. Braun set his sights on building a new one.

But that would have to wait. When the U.S. entered World War I in 1917, Fr. Braun volunteered as an Army chaplain. He was sent to France where he served during the Meuse-Argonne Offensive, the enormous final battle of the war. He insisted on serving the soldiers in extreme danger at the front lines and did so with his characteristic courage, receiving both the Purple Heart and Silver Star.

Fr. Braun returned to the Mescalero. Inspired by the great churches of Europe, he was determined that they, too, should have a beautiful church. But his request to replace the dilapidated church was denied.

You'll never guess what he did next.

He filled the cracks in the deteriorating church with a payload of gunpowder. Then...BOOM. It worked.

The building was condemned and he received permission to build a new one—but was given no money to do it. As you've probably figured out by now, Fr. Braun was never deterred by challenges. "Insignificant!" was his common response to any obstacle.

With \$100 of Army pay in his pocket, he hopped on a train to the other side of the country—Philadelphia!—to meet with architect William Stanton. Inspired by Fr. Braun's vision, Mr. Stanton drew up plans for the new chapel—pro bono.

Then, back on the reservation, Fr. Braun worked with a team that included Apache volunteers, a friend from California, and Franciscan friars fleeing religious persecution in Mexico.

Which country is known as "Our Lady's Dowry"?

It's a title that expresses the deep love of this country's Catholics for Our Lady



"Our Lady's Dowry" refers to the country of England. It is an expression of the devotion of English Catholics to Our Blessed Mother. They consider their country to be under her particular patronage and care, belonging to her in a special way.

The exact origins of this title are unknown. Some say it goes back to Edward the Confessor in the 11th century. It was certainly in common use by the mid-14th century.

Regarding the meaning of the term "dowry," some say that in the context of medieval England, it refers to a portion of property set aside by a husband for the care of his bride in the event of his death. Others identify it as a similar gift provided by the bride's family, as we normally understand the word.

Either way, it is a particular possession of the lady, belonging specifically to her.

Richard II dedicated England to Our Lady around the Feast of Corpus Christi in 1381. This event was depicted in a painting showing the king and queen handing a globe of England to Our Lady with the inscription: *Dos tua Virgo pia haec est, quare rege, Maria* — "This is thy Dowry, loving Virgin, therefore rule over it, Mary."

This painting, unfortunately, has been lost, but the Wilton Diptych—painted in the late 1390s—is similar and is in the National Gallery in London; [view it here](#). Note the angel holding the flag of England. The orb at its apex contains a miniscule map of England.

A number of consecrations of England to Our Lady have taken place since the late 19th century. Just two years ago, on March 29th, 2020, the country was re-dedicated as Our Lady's Dowry. The dedication followed a nationwide tour of a pilgrim statue of Our Lady of Walsingham, England's most famous shrine to Our Lady.

Although it may seem that England and other countries of the West have wandered far from their ancient faith, hope always flourishes for those who know the power of Our Lady. May the prayers of her faithful children in Great Britain and throughout the world bring this once devoted country back to its original fervor.

Why are scapulars of different colors?

*Most Catholics are familiar with the Brown Scapular.
But there are black scapulars, green ones, even red and blue ones.
What do the various colors symbolize?*

Many of the scapulars we are familiar with have their origins in religious orders, being a miniature version of the much larger scapulars worn as part of the religious habit. The smaller "lay" scapular is usually a sign of a person's membership in an order's confraternity: an association of faithful who are not members, but partake in the spirituality and benefits of the order.

Let's look at some examples. The Brown Scapular is one of the best-known Marian sacramentals. In 1251, Our Lady appeared to the English Carmelite St. Simon Stock and, giving him a brown scapular, said that anyone who wore this habit "would not suffer eternal fire." The promise extends to the Confraternity, who wear a miniature version of the original brown Carmelite garment, which covers the entire front and back of the religious habit.

The Passionist order, founded by St. Paul of the Cross in the 18th century and devoted to the Passion of Jesus Christ, has an all black habit with a distinctive badge: a heart with a cross and the words *Jesu XPI Passio*—"The Passion of Jesus Christ." The Confraternity's scapular has a replica of this heart along with the words *sit semper in cordibus nostris*, meaning, "The Passion of Jesus Christ be always in our hearts," a favorite saying of the Order.

An interesting example of a scapular that is *not* connected to a religious order is the Green Scapular, which was given by Our Lady in the 19th century to Sister Justine Bisqueyburu of the Daughters of Charity (the same order as St. Catherine Labouré, who received the Miraculous Medal ten years earlier).

Through this scapular, Our Lady promised the grace of spiritual conversion to unbelievers and lapsed Catholics who wear it and who recite a short supplication to her Immaculate Heart. If an individual in need of conversion refuses to wear it, the giver can slip it into their belongings or under their pillow and recite the prayer on their behalf.

RE: USCCB Pro-Life Chairman Urges Faithful to Pray in Response to Leak of Draft Supreme Court Opinion in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*

WASHINGTON - In response to the leak of a draft opinion in the Supreme Court case of *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization*, Archbishop William E. Lori of Baltimore, chairman of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' (USCCB) Committee on Pro-Life Activities issued the following call to prayer:

“The leak related to the U.S. Supreme Court case of *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* reminds us of the urgent need for prayer and action at this pivotal moment in our country.

“As Catholics, we care about every unborn child and every mother. Our Church has consistently witnessed in word and deed that life begins at the moment of conception. As the bishops shared in our statement *Standing with Moms in Need*: we pledge ‘to redouble our efforts to accompany women and couples who are facing unexpected or difficult pregnancies, and during the early years of parenthood, offering them loving and compassionate care through initiatives such as *Walking with Moms in Need* and countless others.’

“At the same time, as we await the Court’s decision, we urge everyone to intensify their prayer and fasting that the final decision of the Court will bring about the reversal of *Roe* and *Casey*.

“We hope and pray for a change in our laws and stand ready to help all pregnant women in need in each of our communities.

“Our Lady of Guadalupe, pray for us and guide us.”

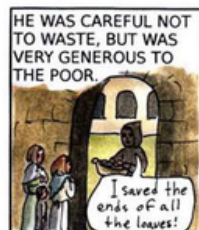

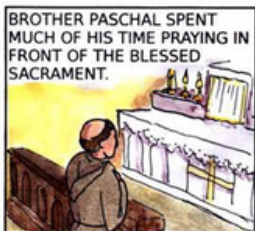

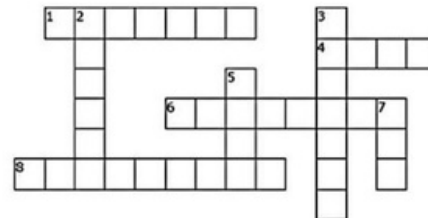
