



**ENCOUNTERING JESUS** 

#### SERRA CLUBS LAUNCH 'ADORE' TO LINK ADORATION & VOCATIONS

\*\*T A Te hear a lot about holy hours, but many people feel they don't have an hour, or even a half-hour," said Margo Geddie, the president-elect of Serra International, the Church's official apostolate to promote vocations. "We feel it's important to encourage people to spend any amount of time-even just ten minutes-visiting Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. I know for me, it's been life-changing."




Why did Serra undertake this project? "It's really pretty simple," said Margo, "For years we've seen the link between vocations and devotion to the Blessed Sacrament. Go to any youth conference, and you can see the enthusiasm, the incredible graces being poured out during Adoration. And these are the same students who are answering the call, entering seminaries and convents.

So we thought if we can promote Adoration

on the local level, we're also promoting vocations to the priesthood and consecrated life."

Of course, "making a visit" has long been a traditional devotion for Catholics, young and old alike. "We also want to encourage older people to say a quick prayer for vocations whenever they're in the chapel," said Margo. "Jesus told us we should beg for what we need—and every Catholic knows we need more sisters and priests."



#### ADVICE TO SEMINARIANS

"Do not think of yourselves as alone, nor by yourselves," said Pope Leo to seminarians in Rome this summer. He quoted a Church document on priestly formation, saying, "Each one of you is the protagonist of his own formation... but protagonist does not mean soloist! Therefore, I invite you always to cultivate communion, first of all with your seminary companions... Finally, the most important thing: keep your eyes fixed on Jesus, cultivating the relationship of friendship with Him."

#### DISCERNMENT MEN DISCERN ON 'THE WAY'

If you've seen Martin Sheen's movie "The Way," you know that many pilgrims who walk Spain's famous Camino begin with a certain goal in mind, but end up receiving far more than they ever imagined.

That was the idea behind the "Discernment Camino" led by Fr. George Sears, the Vocation Director for the Archdiocese of New York. He and a brother priest led four seminarians and nine young men on a 14-day trek across the Spanish countryside, ending at Santiago de Compostela.

"It was an absolutely amazing experience," said Fr. Sears. "Every one of the men built camaraderie and grew closer to the Lord. And at least two of them are excited about applying to seminary next year."

The archdiocese recently made headlines with their "Called by Name" campaign, which identified more than 800 faithful young men. While Fr. Sears can't accompany all of them on the Camino, his Vocation Team has a solid plan to help them begin their own journey to discern God's call.






#### A LIGHT IN THE DARKNESS



## CATHOLIC CAMPAIGN FOR HUMAN DEVELOPMENT WORKING ON THE MARGINS

he Catholic Church has always taught us, through the words of Sacred Scripture and the witness of saints like Francis of Assisi, that the natural world is created by God, that it is good, and that humans have a special duty to care for creation so that it benefits not only themselves but also future generations. Today we live in a time where pollution, climate change, and poor agricultural practices harm creation and place us all in danger.

In 2015, Pope Francis responded to this environmental crisis by issuing the encyclical Laudato Si' (On Care for Our Common Home), in which he emphasizes the connection between humanity and nature and calls for "the whole human family together to seek a sustainable and integral development" (no. 13).

This spirit of cooperation, sustainability, and human dignity animates the work of organizations like La Cosecha Community Supported Agriculture, a cooperative farm network in Albuquerque, New Mexico, which makes locally grown, sustainable, and nutritious foods available to low-income people. With support from the Catholic Campaign for Human Development (CCHD), La Cosecha has expanded its outreach beyond Albuquerque to 11 rural New Mexico counties, increased year-round accessibility to healthy produce and other food products, and obtained a US Department of Agriculture Good Agricultural Practices food-safety certification for its cooperative farm partners.


CCHD-funded organizations show how we can care for the environment, address the needs of the poor, and support responsible and sustainable local businesses at the same time. When you participate in the CCHD collection, you help not only other communities but also your own, because 25% of your contribution remains in your diocese to create local solutions to poverty.

Donate gently used coats, toys, or nonperishable food items to a local charity. Bake or cook something special to share with a friend, teacher, or priest.


Pray as a family for someone new each day — especially those who are struggling or alone.

#### **BREAKING OPEN THE WORD**

#### Feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome -**Gospel Reflection**

Readings: Ezekiel 47:1-2, 8-9, 12. Psalm 46:2-3, 5-6, 8-9. 1 Corinthians 3:9c-11, 16-17. John 2:13-22.


As I write this reflection for the celebration of the feast of the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica, Pope Leo XIV has just taken possession of this historic papal cathedral in Rome, the Archbasilica of St. John Lateran. The new pope has gracefully moved through an unimaginable variety of commemorations and gatherings since his election and installation. Some of these encounters have been in person with ecclesiastical bodies of representatives of the Church. Others have been more homespun, such as the video message he recorded for the Mass and celebration at Comiskey Park (now Rate Field) with his fellow Chicagoans.

The pope has taken on a role that is both ancient and contemporary, a living sign of the Church's leadership in a troubled world. As Pope Leo made his way out the door of the Lateran in majestic procession, I could not help but think that this wise, compassionate and gentle soul will be a moral compass for the world. Catholics are asking Leo to stand at the center point of a bifurcated, polarized society, and reveal the love of God.

Perhaps all the faithful will hear the voice of Ezekial's angel this day bringing us back to the House of God, a temple of unity, peace and justice. The summons by the divine voice is nothing less than a return to our baptism. The Lateran Basilica is a symbol of the Church's ongoing desire to gather the children of God as a mother comforts her own. The water imagery from Ezekiel is extraordinary and echoes that of the reading from Ezekiel that is used during the great Easter Vigil, the mother of all vigils: "Wherever the river flows, every sort of living creature that can multiply shall live. Fruit trees of every kind shall grow. Their fruit shall serve for food and their leaves for medicine."

The worship of the baptized "gladdens the City of God," even as we cast out everything that is not of God. We ask for the same kind of holy zeal that Jesus Himself possessed when He purified the Temple, recorded in today's Gospel. Alternatively, Paul tells the Corinthians that they are "God's building" and that each stone builds on the foundation of Christ Jesus that is already there, constructed by God, the master builder.

The natural question for us all to ask today is, "who or what are we inviting into the building of God that is us? Is it a chaotic place of wild and noisy things that serve no purpose but distraction? Or do we risk holy zeal in it's sanctuary? The degree to which we are devoted to God will be the measure in which we open the doors of our own sanctuary with care - with generous hospitality to the other, mercy to difficult people, a two-hearted river of ideas that welcomes defamiliarization beyond my own pet peeves. The waters of baptism still cover all of us in God's love.


