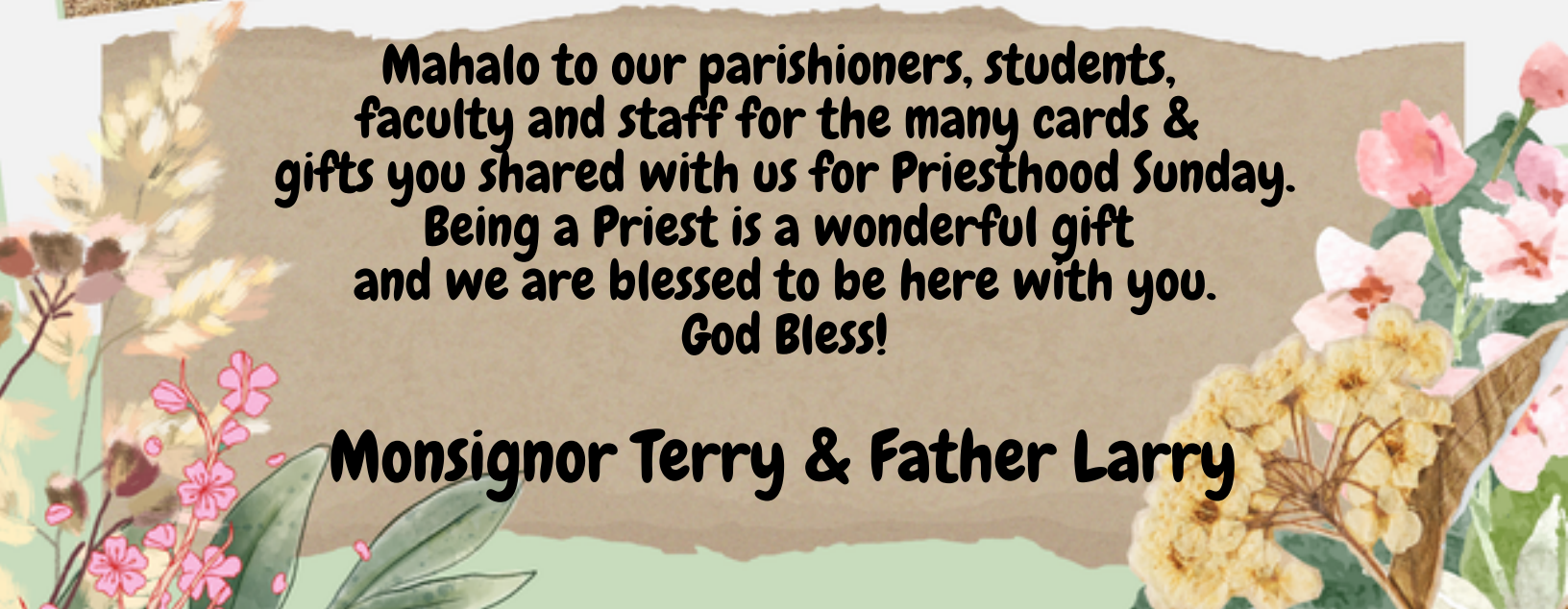

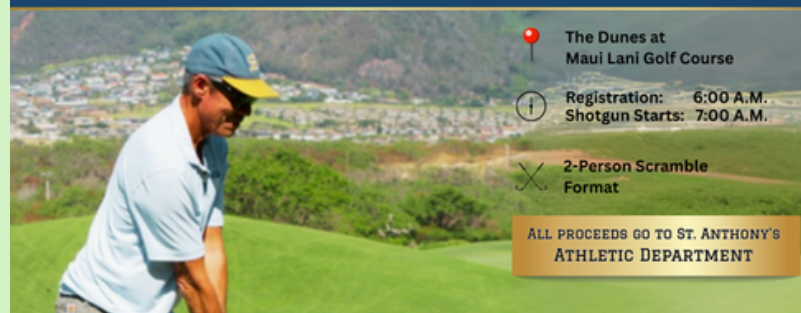

LIFE

Our Sign of Hope



There is perhaps no more beautiful celebration than when parents bring their newborn child to the waters of baptism. Parents, godparents, family, and friends share in this sacrament with incomparable joy. For in baptism, we share in Christ's death and resurrection, and through the outward signs of water and oil, are made *children of God* and given the hope of eternal life with Him.

"The death and resurrection of Jesus is the heart of our faith and the basis of our hope."¹ Through our Lord Jesus Christ, our sins are forgiven, death is overcome, and life is victorious. "Hope dwells as the desire and expectation of good things to come, despite not knowing what the future may bring."² Because of this Christian hope, we can face the unknown trials of life with faith rather than fear.

We are called to be signs of hope to all people, especially those whose goodness, value, and dignity are undermined. As members of the Body of Christ, we carry this hope with us as we continue Jesus' mission on earth. Pope Leo XIV encourages us, "How important it is that each and every baptized person feel himself or herself called by God to be a sign of hope in the world today."³

Sadly, there is a devastating absence of hope today. We see this most profoundly in a sweeping disregard for human life in its most vulnerable forms and stages. Abortion and assisted suicide are products of

hopelessness and despair. Yet even amid the increasing attacks on human life, we know that the "storms that buffet us will never prevail, for we are firmly anchored in the hope born of grace, which enables us to live in Christ and to overcome sin, fear and death."⁴

We have been entrusted with a message of hope for the woman who finds herself unexpectedly pregnant or for the man diagnosed with a terminal illness. At these challenging moments, we must bring God's presence, witnessing to His love, and inspiring a renewal of hope in those whose hearts are burdened. For "hope is born of love and based on the love springing from the pierced heart of Jesus upon the cross."⁵

Having been "buried with Christ in Baptism, we receive in his resurrection the gift of a new life that breaks down the walls of death."⁶ Confident of God's presence within us, may we share the Gospel of Life with those most in need of hope, knowing that "the grace of God precedes and accompanies his people as they press forward firm in faith, active in charity and steadfast in hope."⁷

BREAKING OPEN THE WORD

27th Sunday in Ordinary Time - Gospel Reflection

*Readings: Habakkuk 1:2-3; 2:2-4. Psalm 95:1-2, 6-7, 8-9.
2 Timothy 1:6-8, 13-14. Luke 17:5-10.*

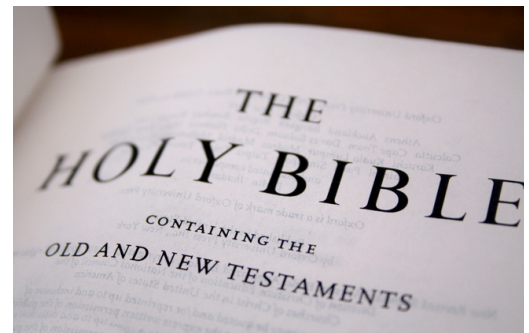
Throughout this month, Sacred Scripture offers inspirational stories that indicate the proper disposition of faith for life's journey. Opening the Word today reveals a challenging one: Persistence.

In the first reading, Habakkuk expresses a common lament: "How long, O Lord," will your people have to experience violence and misery? Continual suffering creates "strife and clamorous discord" in those who believe. The prophet pleads for God to intervene, lest the lack of response be construed as divine approval of all that is happening. In common parlance: "enough is enough." The Lord does respond with a simple reminder that "the vision" remains providentially valid. All will be made right in due time – which is God's time, not ours. Yes, "the just one, because of his faith, shall live," but only if he persists in believing, despite what appears to contradict the vision. The responsorial psalm recognizes the risk to this proposition. Experiencing what appears to be divine indifference can result in a "hardening of hearts." To mitigate this, the psalmist emphasizes the present moment, exhorting believers to listen for God's voice "today" and to respond accordingly with thanksgiving and acclamation.

On the day of the apostles' journey with Jesus, they seem eager for such faith. In Luke's Gospel, they plead with Him to "increase" it, as if more would give them greater abilities. Jesus quickly dissuades them. His telekinetic image of a tiny faith ("the size of a mustard seed") transporting a deeply rooted tree may be supernaturally true, but the contrast intends to highlight the absurdity of conceiving faith in quantifiable terms. Instead, the Lord implants a sense of faith as relational. Switching to a master-servant image, Jesus teaches that having faith in Him does not change their status as followers. Faith does not profit them (or anyone) in an instrumentalist way. They already have "enough" as long as their faith leads them to stay connected to Him. Along the journey of discipleship, persistence matters.

In today's second reading, Paul exhorts that persistence from Timothy who has been transformed by the "gift of God" now at work in his ministry. Paul passed this gift on to Timothy with words of "faith and love" that prove normative for Christian living. As long as he "guards this rich trust" with faith, the indwelling "help of the Holy Spirit" will give Timothy sufficient strength to "bear his share of hardship for the Gospel."

"Enough is enough" may be a common lament in response to frustrations experienced. But for followers of Jesus, believing really is enough. With persistence, Gospel faith leads to beatific vision.
