As an experiment, stand on the top step in front of the Church, looking in through the open doors. What do you see?

The first thing we see is the baptismal font, and as our eyes move past the font they next fall upon the altar. Continuing towards the front of the Church the eyes move upward, catching sight of the cross. Font, altar, and cross: why is the space structured in this way?

The structure and layout of the Church mirrors the journey of a Christian: *through* the font *to* the altar then *to* the cross. In Baptism a person becomes a member of God's family; at the altar the person is nourished and sustained by the Eucharist; and the cross reminds us that, as disciples and followers of Jesus, we too will share in his suffering.

A person enters the Church through Baptism. St. Paul writes, "Do you not realize that when you are baptized in Christ you are baptized into his death?" When a person is submerged in the font, the old self dies. Symbolically, this plunging into the waters of baptism is the act of drowning. In the process the old self dies, only to emerge as a "new creation" in Christ. When the newly-baptized is clothed in a white garment and given a candle lighted



from the Paschal candle, it is a vivid symbol of the "new creation" that has emerged from the water.

The Christian then moves from the font to the altar where, at the table of the Lord, the person partakes in the Eucharist, the central sacrament of our Church. We gather around the Lord's table to be fed and nourished by God, partaking in spiritual food that sustains us through the journey of life.

The cross reminds us that as followers of Christ we share in his death. Just as Christ passed through the realm of death ("He de-

scended into hell, the third day he rose from the dead"), so too must we pass through death in order to reach eternal life. But the cross symbolizes more than actual death: just as Christ suffered persecution, so too may we experience suffering because we are his followers.

Font, altar, and cross: symbols of and way points on the Christian journey. In the renovation of Churches since the Second Vatican Council, the floor plans have retrieved these ancient symbols, incorporating and integrating them in a manner reminiscent of ancient churches of the early Christian centuries. In particular, the baptismal font has been moved from either the vestibule or back of the church to a place of prominence at the entrance, emphasizing the centrality of Baptism in the life of the Christian.

Sometimes taking steps to reduce your environmental impact can feel like it always requires a less convenient option. What if we told you that, in some cases, the more convenient option is also more Earth-friendly? Welcome to the world of washers! Dishwashers, clothes washers, and automated car washes are more water-efficient than manually doing those same chores and if you choose your temperatures and timings wisely they can be pretty energy-efficient too! Generally it's best to use any electricity around midday, when California's grid has a surplus of solar power, and to only use heated washes when you need to. Car washes of course don't need heat, and your clothes will generally prefer cold washes to help them last longer. Especially with modern detergents being so effective, we recommend skipping the warm or hot washes for your clothes for most stains.
