

Quick question: In the late Middle Ages, what was the most popular religious feast in Christianity? If you said Christmas or Easter, you'd be wrong because, by the 14th century, the most popular feast in Christianity was Corpus Christi. How did this come about?

In 1264, Pope Urban IV issued the papal bull, Transiturus de hoc Mundo, establishing Corpus Christi as a feast throughout the Universal (Latin) Church. But the feast of Corpus Christi did not suddenly appear with this document. Celebration and controversy surrounding the Eucharist had been around for centuries, both in theological debate and popular devotion.

Corpus Christi - Latin for the "Body of Christ" - focuses on the Eucharist. In terms of theological debate, the issue revolves around the question of what do we mean when we say Eucharist. In the early Church there was not much philosophical or theological discussion on the subject. For Christians, Eucharist was a mystery involving liturgy, bread and wine, the Body and Blood of Christ, and the presence of the Lord. Major controversies surrounding Eucharist did not emerge until perhaps the eighth and ninth centuries.

The issue came down to one of consubstantiation -vs- transubstantiation (con- is a prefix that means "with"; trans- is a prefix that means "changed into"). In consubstantiation, Christ "dwells within" the consecrated bread and wine, that is, the presence of Christ coexists within the substances of bread and wine. In transubstantiation, the bread and wine are changed: they are no longer bread and wine because their "substance" has been changed or transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ.

By the 13th century the transubstantiation position became the official theology of the Catholic Church, and it was formally and eloquently articulated by Thomas Aquinas in his Summa Theologica. Eventually, the consubstantiation position would be taken up by the Protestant Reformers, and their understanding of Eucharist - coupled with issues concerning the supremacy of the Roman Pontiff and the ordination of women - are regarded as the three "stumbling blocks" that stand in the way of the unification of the Christian Churches.

While theologians argued as to the meaning of the Body and Blood of Christ, devotions and practices surrounding the Eucharist became staples of popular piety. Eucharistic processions and adoration of the Blessed Sacrament were common, and the original feast of Corpus Christi - the Thursday following Trinity Sunday - was a Holy Day of Obligation. By the Middle Ages, the celebration of Corpus Christi bore a striking resemblance to our contemporary "Renaissance Fairs" with entertainment, primitive theater, miracle and morality plays, plenty of food and drink, and religious celebration as well. By the 15th century, Corpus Christi was a more popular feast than Christmas or Easter.

From the perspective of popular piety, Corpus Christi was a huge success, but the catechetical challenge facing the church was, "How do we teach the faithful about the doctrine of transubstantiation?"

The most effective way to do this involved linking the liturgical customs associated with Corpus Christi – processions, exposition, adoration – to the developing theology of Eucharist. By focusing on liturgical practices, the clergy, through preaching, were able make the connection between people's religious behavior to the emerging theology of Eucharist.

GUN SAFETY COMMITTEE GUN DEATHS/INJURIES 2025

In the United States, as of June 15, 2025, there have been 6,566 gun deaths, including homicides, unintentional deaths, and deaths in defensive gun uses, according to the Gun Violence Archive. Additionally, there have been 11,668 injuries from gun violence. Here's a more detailed breakdown: Total Gun Deaths: 6,566, Total Injuries: 11,668, Mass Shootings: 153, Children (0-11) Killed: 108, Teens (12-17) Killed: 441, Officer-Involved Incidents: 30 killed, 143 injured, Unintentional Shootings: 603.Murder/Suicides: 275. Defensive Use: 519. It's important to note that these figures are constantly updated and represent a snapshot in time. You can find more detailed information and ongoing updates at the Gun Violence Archive.
