Was Paul really an Apostle?

The twelve apostles enjoy a privileged role in the Christian tradition. However, with the exception of Peter, James, and John, we know very little about these original followers of Jesus (and what we do know is often a mixture of historical fact and legend). When one of the apostles appears in the Sunday readings, I'd like to focus my weekly column on that particular apostle.

In the liturgical year, the Solemnity of Saints Peter & Paul falls on June 29th. Because it is a solemnity, it takes precedence over the Sunday in Ordinary Time. What does that mean? Red vestments are worn instead of green, the readings are taken from the solemnity rather than the "C" cycle, and the proper prayers and preface of Saints Peter & Paul are used.

In today's column I'd like to focus on one of the more intriguing tangents to today's feast: the question of whether Paul was actually an apostle. Technically speaking, the Christian Scriptures distinguish among disciples, apostles, and "the Twelve" according to the following criteria: a disciple is anyone who is a follower of Jesus; an apostle is anyone who was personally called by Jesus, and the Twelve refers to those twelve men who were personally called by Jesus when he walked the earth. Given these parameters, Paul was a disciple but not one of the twelve, and the first-century debate in the early Church was whether Paul was an apostle.

We can say with almost absolute certainty that Paul never met Jesus while Jesus walked the earth. Additionally, we are confident in saying that Paul did not encounter Jesus when the Lord appeared to various disciples in the interim period between the Resurrection and the Ascension. Paul's encounter with the Risen Lord took place several years later when, armed with letters to the synagogues in Damascus, Saul (Paul) intended to arrest "... any men or women who belonged to the Way, (so that) he might bring them back to Jerusalem in chains" (Acts 9:2). It was on the road to Damascus that Saul was struck down by a blinding light, and it was in this experience that Saul (Paul) claimed to have been "personally called by Christ." Herein lies Paul's claim to be an apostle: Jesus personally called him on the road to Damascus.

However, the Christian Community was very skeptical and suspicious of Saul's supposed conversion. The Acts of the Apostles make it quite clear that Saul was responsible for the death of the first martyr, Stephen (Acts 7:54 - 60), and Acts is also quite emphatic in its description of Saul "trying to destroy the Church, entering house after house and dragging out men and women, (handing) them over for imprisonment" (Acts 8:3). The very name of Saul struck terror in the hearts of Christians, and they were skeptical and suspicious as to whether Saul's conversion was real.

As we read through the Acts of the Apostles and the letters of Paul, it quickly becomes apparent that Paul spent the remainder of his life trying to "legitimize" his claim as an apostle. In his missionary journeys, Paul spread Christianity throughout the Mediterranean world, but his success was not without controversy: Paul's liberal understanding was that one did not have to be Jewish to be Christian. Paul's acceptance of Gentiles into the Church did not meet well with the initial followers of Jesus (who were Jewish). Eventually, Paul's vision of Church ("gentile or Jew, servant or free, women or man, no more") prevailed, but this did not occur until about 30 years after the death and resurrection of Jesus. It was not until the end of the Apostolic Period that Paul was accepted as being an "Apostle."

Asking Saves Kids Campaign on ASK Day

Brady observes the 25th anniversary of its Asking Saves Kids campaign on ASK Day, which takes place each year on June 21 to remind parents, guardians, and caretakers to ask one life-saving question: "Is there an unlocked gun in the home where my child will play." Keeping guns locked and unloaded reduces the risk of unintentional shooting deaths and gun suicides among youth by **73%**. Right now, 4.6 million children in America live in homes with unlocked guns. That's one in three homes with kids. As children spend more time away from home, the likelihood of encountering unsecured firearms increases dramatically. Parents naturally ask about food allergies before playdates. Brady is asking parents to add one more question to safety conversations they're already having. Simply ask "Is there an unlocked gun where my child plays?" This is a crucial step parents can take to protect children.
