# The Cullinan Window: Intrigue Surrounding the Papal Tiara

St. Teresa's has seventeen stained glass windows: twelve in the main body of the Church, one each in the left and right sanctuaries, and three in the vestibule. Since 2010 all seventeen have been restored, and this week's column is a reprint of an earlier column which focused on the Papal Tiara Window, located in the southwest corner of the vestibule facing Connecticut Street.

The Cullinan Window of the Papal Tiara is one of the oldest windows in St. Teresa's Church, dating, perhaps, from the first decade of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. The fact that the window is obscured by the stairs to the choir loft suggests that this was not the window's original location. We believe that, originally, the window was in the main body of the Church, and that it was one of the windows which survived a major fire. The present twelve windows in the main body of the church – which portray events in the life of Christ – date from the 1930s, suggesting that the Tiara Window was moved to the vestibule at about that time.

When the Tiara Window was removed for restoration, the restorer commented that "we don't make (tiara) windows like this any more." I found this intriguing and did some research as to why this might be so.

The tiara – the pope's crown – has been worn by popes since the 8th century, and the three-tiered form (depicted in our window) has been around since the 14th century. The tiara is a non-liturgical ornament, which means that it is only worn for non-liturgical ceremonies, such as a ceremonial procession to church and back (the *miter* is worn by the pope when he is at a liturgical function). A representation of the triple tiara combined with two crossed keys (which is portrayed in our window) was and continues to be used as a symbol of the papacy, appearing on papal documents, buildings and insignia.

The last pope to wear a tiara was Paul VI. In November 1963 – in a gesture of humility symbolizing the papacy's surrender of any claim to temporal power - Pope Paul placed the tiara on the altar of St. Peter's Basilica and never wore it again. The tiara was to be sold and the proceeds given to charity, but Francis Spellman, Cardinal Archbishop of New York, arranged for the tiara to be bought by the Catholic Church in the United States. It is now on permanent display in the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, D.C.

There are at least twenty-four tiaras in existence, the earliest dating from the 16<sup>th</sup> century. The pope, at his discretion, may choose to wear the tiara. However, following the gesture of Paul VI, the subsequent popes (John Paul I, John Paul II, Benedict XVI, Francis I, and Leo XIV) chose not wear the tiara at the ceremony celebrating their election and investiture.

Because the tiara is a non-liturgical ornament and is associated with temporal power, creating a stained glass window of a tiara would, today, be somewhat "politically incorrect." However, when St. Teresa's window was installed a century ago, it was during a time that celebrated the "high point" of an

almost monarchal papacy, a century-long period that spanned roughly from the reign of Pius IX (1846-1878) through Pius XII (1939-1958).

# "Special Statement on Immigration"

by the Roman Catholic Bishops of the United States

On November 12, 2025, and for the first time in 12 years the U.S. bishops issued a Special Message addressing their concern for the evolving situation impacting immigrants in the United States. Collectively the bishops have invoked this particularly urgent way of speaking as a body of

As pastors, we the bishops of the United States are bound to our people by ties of communion and compassion in Our Lord Jesus Christ. We are disturbed when we see among our people a climate of fear and anxiety around questions of profiling and immigration enforcement. We are saddened by the state of contemporary debate and the vilification of immigrants. We are concerned about the conditions in detention centers and the lack of access to pastoral care. We lament that some immigrants in the United States have arbitrarily lost their legal status. We are troubled by threats against the sanctity of houses of worship and the special nature of hospitals and schools. We are grieved when we meet parents who fear being detained when taking their children to school and when we try to console family members who have already been separated from their loved

Despite obstacles and prejudices, generations of immigrants have made enormous contributions to the well-being of our nation. We as Catholic bishops love our country and pray for its peace and prosperity. For this very reason, we feel compelled now in this environment to raise our voices in defense of God given human dignity.

Catholic teaching exhorts nations to recognize the fundamental dignity of all persons, including immigrants. We bishops advocate for a meaningful reform of our nation's immigration laws and procedures. Human dignity and national security are not in conflict. Both are possible if people of good will

We recognize that nations have a responsibility to regulate their borders and establish a just and orderly immigration system for the sake of the common good. Without such processes, immigrants face the risk of trafficking and other forms of exploitation. Safe and legal pathways serve as an antidote to such risks.

The Church's teaching rests on the foundational concern for the human person, as created in the image and likeness of God (Genesis 1:27). As pastors, we look to Sacred Scripture and the example of the Lord Himself, where we find the wisdom of God's compassion. The priority of the Lord, as the Prophets remind us, is for those who are most vulnerable: the widow, the orphan, the poor, and the stranger (Zechariah 7:10). In the Lord Jesus, we see the One who became poor for our sake (2 Corinthians 8:9), we see the Good Samaritan who lifts us from the dust (Luke 10:30-37), and we see the One who is found in the least of these (Matthew 25). The Church's concern for neighbor and our concern here for immigrants is a response to the Lord's command to love as He has loved us (John 13:34).

To our immigrant brothers and sisters, we stand with you in your suffering, since, when one member suffers, all suffer (cf. 1 Corinthians 12:26). You are not alone!

We note with gratitude that so many of our clergy, consecrated religious. and lay faithful already accompany and assist immigrants in meeting their basic human needs. We urge all people of good will to continue and expand such efforts.

We oppose the indiscriminate mass deportation of people. We pray for an end to dehumanizing rhetoric and violence, whether directed at immigrants or at law enforcement. We pray that the Lord may guide the leaders of our nation, and we are grateful for past and present opportunities to dialogue with public and elected officials. In this dialogue, we will continue to advocate for meaningful immigration reform. As disciples of the Lord, we remain men and women of hope, and hope does not disappoint!

May the mantle of Our Lady of Guadalupe enfold us all in her maternal and loving care and draw us ever closer to the heart of Christ.
