The Solemnity of Christ the King

Today is the Last Sunday in ordinary time, the Solemnity of Christ the King, and let's be honest: Americans are suspicions of kings. Granted, we were glued to our television sets when we watched the funeral of Elizabeth II, but such fascination is always tempered by our subversive memory of revolution. Our roots lie in a revolt against another British monarch, George III, and being suspicious of kings seems to be in our very DNA. For this reason, a religious feast promoting Christ as King makes us a tad uncomfortable.

In both our historical memory and secular imagination, we tend to view kings more as tyrannical than benevolent. We associate kings with divine right and power, notions that are incongruent with democratic ideals.

But there is another perspective regarding kingship, a religious one. In the biblical tradition, kingship is more closely linked with prophecy and priesthood than with politics and power. We see this quite clearly in this prayer from the rite of infant baptism:

Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, has freed you from sin and given you new birth by water and the Holy Spirit, and joined you into his people. He now anoints you with the Chrism of salvation, so that you may remain as a member of Christ, Priest, Prophet and King.

Notice that this baptismal prayer of anointing draws upon Old Testament imagery wherein the king is not simply the secular leader of the Hebrew people but their religious leader as well. When a person is baptized, he or she is incorporated into God's household, sharing in Christ's priesthood, prophetic nature, and kingship.

Historically, the first 800 years of Israelite history did not include a king. God called Abraham in about 1800 BC, and over 500 years passed until Moses led the Israelites out of Egypt and brought them to the Promised Land. The Judges ruled Israel for 250 years before Saul united the Twelve Tribes, becoming the first Israelite King in about 1000 BC.

Saul was followed by David and Solomon, and the monarchy continued for about 400 years, coming to an end with the Babylonian Captivity (587 - 538 BC). When the Israelites returned from Babylon they did so without a king, and over time a belief developed whereby the return of a king like David would be a sign that God has reestablished "... a chosen race, a holy nation, a people set apart." Essentially, the return of the king would signify the beginning of the Messianic Age, an era when God's reign would be established over all the earth. Reading between the lines, this image is evident in Eucharistic Prayer for Reconciliation II:

Bring us to share . . . the unending banquet of unity, in a new heaven and a new earth


where the fullness of your peace will shine forth, in Christ

Jesus our Lord.

The Feast of Christ the King was established in 1925 by Pope Pius XI and was assigned to the last day of October. Suffice it to say that the origins, rationale, and evolution of this Feast are fascinating material for a homily. A good starting point for such a homily might be the twelfth stained glass window in the body of the Church. Located in the northwest corner of the worship space, the window understands Christ's kingship as a Christological event.

Following the Second Vatican Council, the Feast was elevated to the rank of Solemnity and is annually celebrated on the Last Sunday of Ordinary Time.

GUN SAFETY COMMITTEE

As of mid-November 2025, gun violence statistics for the US in 2025 show a continuing decline in overall shooting deaths from the pandemic-era peak, but still represent a significant public health crisis. Kev statistics for the US in 2025 (as of November 17, 2025, according to the Gun Violence Archive) include:

- Total number of homicides/murders/ unintentional deaths: 12.977
- Total number of injuries: 23,566
- Mass shootings (defined as four or more victims shot, injured or killed, not including the shooter): 374
- Children (ages 0-11) killed: 198
- Teens (ages 12-17) killed: 899
