All Saints, All Souls, & All Hallows' Eve

Friday night was Halloween, a celebration which, with its spirits, ghosts, and goblins, seems decidedly "pagan." Yesterday, November 1st, was the Feast of All Saints, and today, November 2nd, is the Feast of All Souls. The later two feasts, All Saints and All Souls, are religious in character, and in this week's column I'd like to focus on how these three days are connected.

Beginning with the religious feasts, All Saints' Day (November 1st) is, in a way, much like our American holiday of Veteran's Day. Without naming names, Veteran's Day remembers, celebrates and honors all who have served in the armed forces. In a similar fashion, All Saints' Day remembers, honors, and celebrates the "nameless saints" who are with God.

Broadly speaking, a saint is anyone who has "made it" to heaven. This group includes not only the "official saints" who have been canonized by the Church, but, more importantly, the "unknown saints" (such as our deceased relatives and friends) whom we hope and believe are with God. These unknown saints remain "nameless" only because they have not been officially canonized by the Church.

Today, All Souls' Day (November 2nd) focuses those who are in the process of *becoming* saints. In Catholic theology we have a doctrine of purgatory which, simply stated, refers to the time following death when the soul is "purged" or "purified" before entering the kingdom of heaven. Souls in purgatory are in transition between earthly existence and heavenly glory. When we pray for the dead, we do so with the intention that they might be delivered from purgatory and admitted to heaven. On All Saints' Day, we honor those who have "made it," who are already saints with God. On All Souls' Day, we pray for those who are not yet saints but who soon will be.

Christians have honored and venerated the dead (and the saints) since the earliest days of the Church. For example: In first century Rome, Christians gathered in the catacombs of the city, celebrating the Eucharist on tables that stood over the bones of Christian martyrs (this is the origin of the relics that are sealed in an altar at its consecration). In the liturgy, during the Creed, we confess our belief in the "Communion of Saints." Later in the liturgy, in the Eucharistic Prayer, we not only remember "those who have gone to their rest in the hope of rising again" but also name "Mary, the virgin Mother of God, Joseph, her spouse, the apostles, martyrs, and all of the saints who have done your will throughout the ages."

The two Christian Feasts of All Saints and All Souls follow the celebration of Halloween. The origins of Halloween – or All Hallows' Eve – are really difficult to pin down. In many non-Christian cultures there are feasts or festivals that focus on spirits and the dead. In pre-Christian Britain, for example, there was a fall festival which saluted Samhain, the "lord of death," who was thought to gather together the souls of the year's dead. Similar festivals occur in other cultures as well, and it is safe to assume that the Church "baptized" these celebrations, transforming them from pagan rituals to religious feasts.

Here at St. Teresa's, during the month of November. we have a custom to commemorate the dead. We invite our parishioners to bring photos of their deceased loved ones and arrange them around the baptismal font where they remain on display through the Feast of Christ the King. Additionally, we have a special commemoration for those who have died during the past year or have been buried from this parish. Their names are inscribed on a banner which is on display in the sanctuary throughout the month of November. At the 10 o'clock Mass on the first Sunday of November, we read their names aloud as we light candles in their names to honor their memory.



What is gun violence?

Gun violence is violence committed with firearms, such as handguns, shotguns, or semi-automatic rifles. More than 600 people are estimated to die every day from gun violence with two-thirds of gun-related deaths, including suicides, occurring in just six countries (in descending order): Brazil, the USA, Venezuela, Mexico, India and Colombia. Up to 71% of all homicides globally involve gun violence. The majority of victims and perpetrators are young men, but women are at particular risk of violence from an intimate partner possessing a firearm. Sexual violence can also be perpetrated at gun-

Firearms cause devastating injuries that leave a lasting impact on mental and physical health. Some gunshot victims need intensive, lifelong care. Others may lose their ability to work. Many have little or no access to programs that offer adequate long-term care and rehabilitation.
