The Exultation of the Holy Cross

When you walked into Church today you may have noticed that the green of Ordinary Time has been replaced with red altar cloths, banners, and vestments. Why, in the middle of Ordinary Time, is there a change from green to red?

The reason for the change is because September 14th is the *Feast of the Exultation of the Holy Cross*. From a liturgical perspective, whenever, in Ordinary Time, a Feast of the Lord falls on a Sunday, the feast takes precedence over the Sunday readings. This occurs on the *Feast of the Presentation* (February 2nd), the *Transfiguration of the Lord* (August 6th), and the *Exultation of the Holy Cross* (September 14th). In today's column I'd like to provide background material as to the origins and history of the feast.

The Feast of the Exultation of the Holy Cross recalls three events:

- The finding of the True Cross by St. Helena;
- ◆ The dedication of churches built by the Emperor Constantine on the sites of the Holy Sepulchre and Mount Calvary; and
- ◆ The elevation of the True Cross at Hagia Sophia in Constantinople by the Byzantine emperor Heraclius.

St. Helen, the mother of Roman emperor Constantine, traveled to the Holy Land in the years 326–328. According to tradition, while she was there she discovered the hiding place of three crosses that were believed to have been used at the crucifixion of Jesus. To one cross was affixed title bearing Jesus' name, but Helen was unsure of its legitimacy until a miracle revealed that it was the True Cross.

Paralleling the tradition surrounding St. Helen, Bishop Macanius of Jerusalem caused excavation to be made in order to ascertain the locations of Calvary and the Holy Sepulchre. This took place around 327. It was in the course of these excavations that the wood of the cross was recovered. Following the discovery, churches were built on the sites.


Three centuries later the Sasanians conquered Jerusalem (614), and relics of the Holy Cross fell into the hands of the Persian Emperor Chosroes. 15 years later (629) the relics were returned to Constantinople where the elevation of the True Cross took place at the church of Hagia Sophia.

The Vatican has relics believed to be fragments of the True Cross, housed in the Treasury of St. Peter's Basilica. These fragments, believed to have been brought to Rome by Saint Helena, are considered important symbolic objects of Christian devotion, though their authenticity cannot be definitively proven

While the absolute authenticity of these relics is uncertain, they hold immense symbolic value and are important in devotion, representing the Passion of Christ. These artifacts are also valuable pieces of early Christian art and history, reflecting centuries of belief and tradition.

GUN SAFETY COMMITTEE

Gun Violence Must Stop, Here's What We Can Do to Prevent More Deaths (Part 2)

Gun safety: Part of a public health approach to gun violence is about preventing the imminent risk of lethality through sensible oun laws and a culture of safety.

- 1. Sensible oun laws: Reduce easy access to dangerous weapons by banning high capacity magazines and bump stocks, requiring without loopholes, instituting and reinstituting the assault weapons ban immediately.
- 2. Establish a culture of gun safety: As the nation on earth with the most guns, we must make sure people are safe.
- 3. Reduce firearm access to youth and individuals who are at risk of harming themselves or others. This includes keeping guns out of the hands of those who have been violent toward their partners and families, and those with previous violent convictions, whether through expanding lethality assessment and background checks or supporting domestic violence bills and gun violence restraining orders.
