The Gospel of Matthew

As many of you know, the liturgical year begins on the First Sunday of Advent. Many of you also know that there is a three-year cycle of Gospel readings and that this year we are in Cycle A . . . which means that the majority of our Sunday Gospels are taken from Matthew. Since we have recently finished the Advent-Christmas season and have now returned to “Ordinary Time,” I’d like to provide some background information about the Gospel of Matthew and what we should look for in this current cycle of readings.

Although Matthew’s Gospel appears as the first book in the New Testament it was actually Mark’s Gospel that was written first, sometime between 65-70 CE. Matthew and Luke were written later (75-85 CE,) and both evangelists used Mark as a source for their material. As a group, the Gospels of Matthew, Mark, and Luke are called the Synoptic Gospels because they have the “same point of view.” In fact, almost the entire Gospel of Mark appears virtually word for word in both Matthew and Luke.

However, both Matthew and Luke draw upon additional source material for their gospels with each evangelist presenting his material with a particular theological slant. In Matthew’s case, the evangelist is writing to an audience that is familiar with Jewish beliefs, traditions, and culture. We believe that Matthew wrote to a Jewish audience in an attempt to persuade them that Jesus was, in fact, the promised Messiah. For this reason Matthew quotes the Old Testament more than any other evangelist (about twice as much as Luke or Mark), and the pattern you will see repeated again and again in Matthew is “ . . . this was done to fulfill what was said by the Prophet _____ .”

In the Gospel of Matthew there is an implicit comparison between Jesus and Moses. Moses is the most important figure in the Old Testament, and Matthew makes a conscious effort to establish Jesus as the “New Moses.” Following are several examples of Matthew’s comparison of Jesus to Moses:

- Attempts were made to murder both Moses and Jesus when they were infants (Pharaoh /King Herod)
- Both Moses and Jesus were “law givers” (the 10 Commandments and the Beatitudes/Sermon on the Mount)
- Moses and Jesus each are responsible for the central religious celebration (Passover and the Last Supper); and
- Both Moses and Jesus led people from slavery to freedom (Egypt to the Promised Land; slavery to sin/freedom from suffering and death).

As we move through this liturgical year (Cycle A) I will explore in more detail some of these characteristics of the Gospel of Matthew.

Sustainable Kitchen: Plant-Forward

Meals & Less Waste

Changing how we eat is one of the most powerful ways to lower our environmental impact. This doesn't necessarily mean becoming a strict vegetarian; it means being mindful of the resources required to put food on our plates. A "plant-forward" approach puts vegetables, beans, nuts, and grains at the center of the plate, treating meat more as a garnish or side. This significantly reduces carbon and water footprints compared to meat-heavy diets. Equally important is stopping food waste before it starts:

- **Plan Ahead:** Shop with a list to avoid impulse buys that spoil.
- **Shop Your Fridge:** Design one meal a week specifically to use up leftovers or produce that is about to turn.
- **Store Smart:** Learn which fruits and vegetables stay fresh longer in the drawer versus on the counter.

GUN SAFETY COMMITTEE

Developments for Gun Safety and Regulation

State-Level Action: Several states continue to advance gun safety measures, including "red flag" laws, enhanced background check regulations, and restrictions on certain types of firearms.

Increasing State Rankings: According to Everytown for Gun Safety, more states are enacting laws that strengthen, rather than weaken, regulations, such as in Maine.

Focus on Accountability: New rules for gun dealers are being implemented, emphasizing transparency and reporting on stolen or lost firearms to prevent illegal trafficking.

Public Safety Focus: In some jurisdictions, executive orders are being used to increase awareness.
