The Baptism of Jesus: An Embarrassment for the Early Church

Reading through Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John, it's surprising to discover that very few things appear in all four Gospels. For example: the stories of Jesus' birth – as well as the *Sermon on the Mount* and the *Our Father* – are found only in Matthew and Luke, and the *Institution of the Eucharist* at the Last Supper occurs in only three of the four Gospels (Jesus washes the disciples' feet in the Gospel of John). The fact is that only a handful of things appear in all four Gospels. These include the *Feeding of the Five Thousand*, the *Crucifixion*, and the *Resurrection*. The *Baptism of Jesus* also finds itself in this elite category, which begs us to ask, "What was so important about Jesus' Baptism that all four evangelists chose to write about it?"

It may come as a shock to many Christians that, perhaps, the Baptism of Jesus appears in all four gospels because it was an *embarrassment* to the early church. How did such a bizarre conclusion come about? Let me suggest what may have happened.


First and foremost, we need to recognize that, since the earliest days of the church, Baptism was the means by which new members were initiated into the community. The *Acts of the Apostles* gives us several examples of this practice. In Acts 2:41, on Pentecost, "Those who accepted his message were baptized, and about three thousand persons were added that day." In Acts 9:18, after his conversion on the Damascus road, Saul was baptized. And in Acts 10:48, Cornelius and other Gentiles were baptized after listening to the preaching of Peter.

It is quite clear that Baptism was the means through which people were initiated into the Christian Community. What is less clear is the *meaning* of that Baptism. Baptism symbolized changing one's life, leaving the past behind and "putting on Christ." Given this rich symbolism, it is not hard to jump from "washing away the past" to the "cleansing and forgiveness of sin." By the time that the Gospels were written, the Theology of Baptism included the forgiveness of sin. One "washed away the past" and "put on Christ."

The "embarrassment" occurred when someone asked the obvious question: "If Baptism washes away sin, why does Jesus – who is without sin – go into the baptismal waters?"

In order to answer this question, we have to recognize that the baptism by John in the Jordan was categorically different from the Sacrament of Baptism practiced in the early church. John's baptism was an act of repentance, much like what we do on Ash Wednesday. When we place ashes on our foreheads, we "turn away from sin and follow the Gospel." Being signed with ashes is a sign that we want to change our behavior and live out faith on a deeper level. Being signed with ashes does not mean that our sins are forgiven; it does mean that we want to change our behavior and eliminate the "sinful practices" in our lives. John the Baptist never claimed that his baptism washed away sin. Only at later date did the Church connect Baptism with the forgiveness of sin.

When Jesus was baptized by John, he was "turning away" from his hidden life in Galilee to begin his public ministry, a path that would culminate in his death and resurrection.

Start the Year with Impact: Know Your Footprint!

New Year's resolutions often focus on personal improvement—health, finance, or learning a new skill. This January, consider adding "planet improvement" to your list. It is difficult to manage what you do not measure, so the first step toward a more sustainable year is understanding your current environmental impact.

Calculating your personal "footprint" gives you a baseline for improvement. It doesn't have to be drastic; awareness helps you spot the easiest wins.

- **Carbon:** Use an online calculator to see how your travel and energy habits stack up.
- **Water:** Look at your utility bill or consider how often you run appliances like dishwashers and washing machines.
- **Waste:** Do a simple "bin audit." What are you throwing away most often? Can it be reduced, composted or recycled?

Once you have your number, set one achievable goal—like reducing your waste by 10% or taking one fewer car trip per week.
