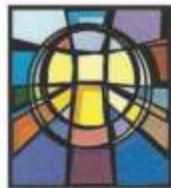

“Turning Points in Life - A Few Further Thoughts”

Last week, we pictured Jesus walking along the shoreline - people at work, nets in hand, life moving along as usual. This week, we return to that same moment, not to repeat it, but to notice it more closely.

What stands out is when Jesus calls the fishermen. Not in a moment of crisis or searching, but right in the middle of an ordinary day. They are busy, capable, and settled into their routines.



Jesus doesn't pull them away because their lives lack meaning. He calls them within their lives, inviting them to see familiar work and daily rhythms in a new light. Nothing is dismissed. Nothing is wasted. And yet, everything is opened to change.

There is no urgency here - just presence, invitation, and choice. Holiness appears quietly, woven into everyday life.

So we return to the shoreline once more, listening again - not because the story has changed, but because we might be ready to hear it differently.

Footprints In The Snow

After all the snow we've just received, I stepped outside this morning and immediately felt it - the world was quieter somehow. Sounds were softened. Edges blurred. Streets I walk every day looked new again. Even the ordinary seemed to slow me down.

Snow does that. It asks us to pause.

I found myself stepping more carefully, looking more closely. I noticed things I usually rush past: a branch bent low under the weight of snow, footprints crossing a driveway that hadn't been shovelled, the way the light reflected and made everything shine just a little more.

Standing there, it struck me that snow teaches us not to miss the miracle - not because it's dramatic, but because it's

gentle. It doesn't demand attention. It simply offers it.



And I couldn't help but think how much of God's presence is like that. Not loud. Not flashy. Quietly transforming what we thought we already knew. The same streets, the same routines - and yet, if we're paying attention, something feels different.

As I took it all in, I realized that wonder doesn't always arrive with an announcement. Sometimes it falls slowly, steadily, covering the ordinary with grace. The invitation I want to share with you is simply this: notice - and don't miss the miracle right in front of you.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH



February is **Black History Month**.

The theme underscores that Black Canadians have a rightful place in the nation's narrative, with over 400 years of historical presence on these Indigenous lands, deserving acknowledgment and celebration.

In this article, history professor Christopher Stuart Taylor, who is featured in the episode *Migrations*, tells us why we need to broaden the story of Black migration to Canada.



Angus is known for exploring how culture and social change intersect. Read his Broadview interview on why he says Canada is in a "fragile moment."



Lloyd Axworthy is a Canadian politician and academic, best known as Canada's Minister of Foreign Affairs from 1996 to 2000. A Liberal Party leader on the global stage, he played a key role in efforts to ban landmines and advance human security. In a Broadview interview, Axworthy critiques Canada's deference to U.S. demands under President Trump and calls for a stronger, more independent approach to Canadian sovereignty.




The Starving Artist Myth: Practical Career Strategies for Creatives

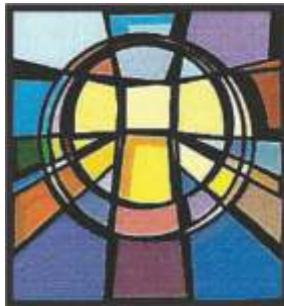
