

BOATING GUIDELINES



GENERAL WATERCRAFT SAFE OPERATING GUIDELINES

- All operators must be aware of and obey all North Carolina boating regulations.
- Stay at least 200ft. away from shorelines, docks, or other structures and adhere to all No Wake zones.
- Passengers must sit in designated seating areas only. Never sit on a bow while the engine is running. This can lead to severe injury or death.
- Life vests must be available for every passenger and must be worn by all passengers under 13 years old.
- Vessels towing skiers or other towables should always have an observer and remain at least 100ft. away from other vessels.
- Operators born after 1988 must have an NC Boater Safety Certificate to operate a watercraft with a 10hp+motor.

RULES OF THE ROAD

Safe navigation is very much a matter of boating courtesy and observing the **Golden Rule of marine traffic**. Certain navigational *rules of the road* must be understood and adhered to by everyone using public waterways.

MOVE TO THE RIGHT! When two (2) vessels approach each other from opposite directions, each must alter course to the right to avoid collision.



WAKE RESPONSIBLY



NC WILDLIFE GUIDELINES FOR WAKE BOAT RESPONSIBILITY

- No Wake zones extend 100ft from any dock, anchored or moored vessel, swim float, marked swimming area, swimmers, persons engaged in angling, or any manually operated propelled vessels.
- Stay at least 200ft away from the shoreline, docks, or other physical structures around the lake.
- Keep music at reasonable levels. Sound travels well over water. If it is loud enough to hear at 80ft behind your vessel, it is likely loud enough for homeowners and others to hear.
- Minimize repetitive passes on any one portion of the lake or shoreline. Once you've run the same line for awhile, move on to another area.
- Completely empty ballasts before launching. The ballasts of wake boats fill with water and transfer of aquatic nuisance species could be an issue.
