




Opening of Art and Faith Resource Centre

An Art and Faith Resource Centre has been in the pipeline for a number of years and it's exciting to see the dream finally materialise. In 1999 a questionnaire was sent out to various Seven Plus artists asking for their input on a resource centre. Many of the respondents could see the value of a multi-purpose centre which could be an informal meeting point for local artists, a networking base for Christian art professionals, a resource of current art journals and publications, a library of art and faith material, a place to inquire about art funding and local art news, and a home base for the Chrysalis Seed collectives.

After many months of searching for a good central site, we have now leased two rooms in The Arts Centre. One room will be the Chrysalis Seed office and the other room will house the collection of art and faith resources. The collection of resources has been gathered together loosely since the 1970s and more specifically during the last five years. It includes publications on art philosophy, art and faith, art biographies, art history reference books, New Zealand art, and art genre and instructional books. The Centre subscribes to over twenty art and literary journals, and has a collection of poetry anthologies with a focus on poets from the Canterbury region. We have funding information on file and have a resource of art web sites throughout the world.

Although the initial focus has been on visual arts and poetry, the true vision of Chrysalis Seed extends to all media and art forms including theatre, dance, music, design, art education, history and philosophy, fiction and non-fiction writing, and so on. We are committed to biculturalism and want to encourage the rich taonga of artists of our nation. We welcome all artists, art professionals, art lovers and others who want to find out more about Chrysalis Seed or our resource centre to come and visit. We would love to hear any suggestions you have for the Centre and we will shortly be looking for volunteers to assist at the Centre.

You are warmly invited to attend the opening week of the Chrysalis Seed Art and Faith Resource Centre from Tuesday 27-31 March, Tuesday – Friday 12.30–5.30pm and Saturday 10am–4pm. After the opening week the Centre will be open Monday – Friday 12.30–5.30, and Saturday



How to find us:

The Centre is located on the Second Floor above Southern Ballet. From the Worcester Street Boulevard (Museum end) enter the North Quad of The Arts Centre by walking through the Clock Tower archway next to Le Cafe. Turn left and walk to the Southern Ballet and Cloisters Theatre entrance. Go through this entry and up the flight of stairs. Turn right and walk to the end of the hallway and go up the flight of stairs on the right. Walk to the end of the corridor where you will see the Chrysalis Seed Trust sign on a doorway to the left.





Who are Seven Plus?

We are a network of like-minded visual artists in Canterbury who meet to encourage each other in our art and faith. Most of us are established working artists, local to Canterbury, ranging in age from early 20's to mid '60s. We represent various aspects of the art world: some of us exhibit locally, nationally and internationally; others work in commercial art and design, or teach. Some are currently studying art at the School of Fine Arts or the Polytech and others have been around longer than we care to mention. Included in our ranks are also a network of art lovers who have a commitment to the vision of Seven Plus but may not be practising artists. Their support is greatly valued.

Seven Plus is one of the art networks under the umbrella of the Chrysalis Seed Trust which is a charitable trust under the auspices of Spreydon Baptist Community Services.

One of the underlying visions of the Chrysalis Seed Trust is: To encourage the development of artistic gifts, personal growth and community in every media and discipline in a way that is relevant, contemporary and skilful. This includes facilitating events and developing resources as needed.

Journey: A walk-through installation

Centre of Contemporary Art. 13 December 2000 – 6 January 2001

As I have come to expect from the Seven Plus Group, "Journey" is a polished, provocative, and well realised show with an interesting premise and rewarding conclusion.

The use of the maze (labyrinth) gives the show a self contained feel in a part of CoCA that can sometimes feel vulnerably exposed. Also, the beautifully crafted flax paper that forms the maze gives off a light, airy quality - contrasting itself nicely with the more solid, rigid ceramics it contains. Altogether a very nice use of space.

Mark Lander's playful pieces start the journey, indicating his prime input into the show, as well as his importance and popularity as one of New Zealand's leading ceramicists. My only gripe is that his "Palmtree Clock" was not in the show when I saw it (admittedly at the end of its run). CoCA has had a habit of doing this over the years, which has the effect of lessening the cohesiveness of the exhibition as a whole, all of which is rather unfortunate.

The other ceramic sculptor of note (before this exhibition) Tim Brown, exhibited "Broken" and "Pacific Amphora" - quite beautiful pieces that suggest the appearance of recently excavated historical treasures. Add this together with Jo O'Hara's almost obligatory oriental touch with "Refreshment" (which turned out to be one of my favourite works), cleverly juxtaposed with Verdon Cochrane's chunky vessels of a more utilitarian quality, and you have a group of ceramicists that would excite most gallery visitors.

As the journey continues you find Anne Fountain and Kees Bruin; surprise inclusions in terms of expected medium, together with Godfrey Sim, whose experiences with clay will hopefully continue from this first effort.

Bridget Underhill's classically inspired pieces are well realised, and have an honesty to them that speaks of their affiliation to the medium, whereas Rob D'Auvergne, Andrew Clarkson and Ben Lander were far more experimental. Ben's panels were the standout work in the show. Delicate yet gutsy, complex yet beautifully simple, his images danced through my vision long after I had left the show.

"Journey" is refreshingly different from the first showing of this groups work at CoCA, yet it is equally successful. This show (and indeed the Seven Plus group themselves) goes against the grain of contemporary art practices by shunning the "artist in splendid isolation" myth. Instead, it embraces a collective spirit, united by a common faith, to create artworks that are themselves responses to a shared experience. They are, therefore, artifacts that belong not to a single 'genius', but to a community that shares a creative output. Isn't this, after all, what art should really be about?

Other Comments on Journey

Warren Feeney - Director of Centre of Contemporary Art

Group shows tend to be quite diverse and varied - I think this show worked because the works were intelligently integrated. By having a maze it overcame the difficulty of having conflicting aesthetic points of view. This became an advantage because of the notion of turning corners and discovering different works by different artists.

Dr Mark Stocker - Department of Art History, University of Canterbury

It was a thoughtful art installation - well-thought through and it created a haven of serenity which was due to the quality of the subjects and the way they were arranged. If there were any Christian overtones - they were handled sensitively and subtlety and would appeal to people of all faiths or no faiths - it was inclusive. My regret is that something like this is not installed on a more permanent basis.

Kees Bruin:

The whole part of working as a collaborative team was the best part of the show for me. It was good fun and involved a good sense of harmony.

Bridget Underhill:

Journey was a lot of fun. We spent a number of months preparing for the show and the dynamic of working as a team had all kinds wonderful spinoffs such as sharing the workload, learning new skills, hearing each other's stories, and seeing a project through from conception to realisation. We were very grateful for the coverage in The Press, Christchurch Mail and the Christchurch Star, and television coverage on Prime and CHTV. Anne Fountain was interviewed on Radio RDU, and almost half of the show was sold. Many thanks to all who helped and supported the show.

Anne Fountain will be holding a solo show at Christopher Moore Gallery in Wellington in May.


Art and literary competitions, awards and opportunities

They include the airfares and a \$3000 per month stipend for the chosen artists. "These residencies are partnerships with prestigious institutions," Arts Board Chair Christopher Finlayson says. A ten-part series, entitled Fearful Symmetries: Arts in the Twentieth Century, will be broadcast on Radio New Zealand's Concert FM from Sunday, 25 February and also has a website companion. Created and produced by Radio New Zealand's creative team, Roger Smith and Gareth Watkins, the 90-minute programmes can be heard at 9am on Sundays with repeated broadcasts at 8pm on Fridays. The programmes focus historically on each decade of the 20th century and look at literature, theatre, visual arts, architecture, fashion and music. The series maintains an international focus but from a New Zealand perspective, where Colin McCahon, Kendrick Smithyman or Lyell Cresswell might rub shoulders with James Joyce, T.S.
