### What to Do After a Serious Truck Accident in Texas

time to fully develop. Seeking immediate medical attention also creates important documentation connecting the injuries to the collision.

If possible, the accident scene should be documented carefully. Photographs of the vehicles, roadway conditions, skid marks, debris, and visible injuries can become valuable evidence later. Information involving the trucking company, DOT numbers, witnesses, and responding law enforcement officers should also be preserved whenever possible.

Insurance companies often attempt to contact victims quickly after a crash. In serious trucking cases, it is generally wise to speak with an attorney before providing recorded statements or signing authorizations. Early statements are frequently used later to dispute injuries or limit the value of a claim.

## Common Causes of Truck Accidents in Texas
