













Our Heritage Disappearing




Years before the coming of the machine and assembly line, the people of this area worked on the land or went down to the sea with only what their skillful hands could create. Everything from the schooners they sailed in to the straw hats on their heads was the work of great craftsmen.


Some think of these as the "Golden Years" but there were many hardships and trials in their lives. The size of the villages and the interdependence of one on anothers ability to produce useful goods, made the communities very close knit. The craftsman worked with a sence of pride in his workmanship, and with the need to accomplish something that would be useful to the community.


Gradually the world changed. Tractors replaced oxen and plow, store bought clothes replaced those made by hand, and the wooden sailing ships were replaced by metal ships. Slowly the craftsmen and their work began to disappear, for they and their work weren't necessary for survival anymore.



The dory is still a symbol of Nova Scotian shipbuilding. Although the manufacturing of these versatile boats has declined to the work of only a few craftsmen, they are still shipped to customers all over the world.









While the artisans of today produce works that will appeal and sell to the public, the artisans of yesterday produced works that were used for the continuation of their way of life. These then are the real craftsmen, those which had the ability to create the tools of their communities. And each had their own standard of workmanship and the tools they made each had their own distinctive style to the basic traditional design.


There was a bond that existed between the craftsman, his creations and their functions. His work linked him to his community and his community to him.




Mark Augustus Lloyd Almeda


Bobby James Cleveland




Christina Beth Collins "Rotten"






Susan Diane Lohnes






Timothy Gerard Ritcey "Icky"

Graduation night was something we worked towards, something we looked forward to all our school lives, but it was something in the future. Now, suddenly, and it does seem sudden, this night is upon us. In just minutes we will no longer be students of L.H.S. but graduates of L.H.S. It is a term that we have worked hard to acquire and are proud to bear, but it means that we are thrust from the distinction of being the Grade 12 class, and the leaders in our school, to the obscurity of being graduates, as countless others before us. We must begin to work from the bottom again, among new people, and we must work hard, before we will be able to gain any kind of recognition for ourselves.

We are standing on the threshold of infinite possibilities. Every possible avenue of further education is open to us: work, vocational schools, universities, and each of us has chosen our path for next year. We're looking forward to our futures, but at the same time we are wondering if we have made the right choices. It is with eagerness that we look to next year, and the following years, each of us wanting to prove we are up to the challenge of competition in a wider field than we have experienced in school. We see also what we are leaving behind, and it saddens us.

For thirteen years we have interacted with the same people, and through those years both strong and casual friendships have been developed. Along with the friendship, a sense of unity has emerged. Any class is a mini social structure with its leaders, its followers, it athletes and its academic achievers. We have overcome the barriers that such a structure suggests. Each of us has a place in our class and each is important to it. We have acquired a closeness and a sense of sharing with everyone in a large unit, and that is something that we will never

likely be a part of again. Several times this year we have gotten together as a class, often for fun things like a pot luck supper or a car wash, and once, sadly, for a funeral. We will always have our friends, but the closeness we have felt on those occasions we will never again feel with such a large group of people as strongly as we have felt it with our classmates. It's an experience we have benefitted from and it saddens us to know that this bond will inevitably be broken by the breaking up and dispersal of our class as each of us follows our chosen careers.

The closeness we feel is heightened tonight for we share common emotions. We share excitement, and sadness, and pride, and we share thankfulness. The thankfulness we feel is directed towards our parents and our teachers, and they indeed should be thanked for, truly and honestly, if not for them we would not be here tonight.

Our parents have contributed greatly to our education. Not only have they seen us through countless tests and assignments and constant grumblings on one subject or another, but they have instilled in us morals and values. They have given us a sense of right and wrong. They have imparted to us a knowledge of the social graces so that we might be socially acceptable. Our glory tonight is also theirs.

A part of our glory tonight also belongs to our teachers. They taught us the things they were supposed to teach us and more. Some of the best times we have had in school this past year have been when one of our teachers has participated in an informal discussion with genuine interest, or has joined in on a joke. The discussions sometimes made us think about what is going on in the world today, or what possibilities exist for the future. Sometimes they made us question our values or showed us another side of human nature. Whatever the result, they taught us more than learning from a book and they showed us that teachers are not always the monsters they are made out to be.

Our experiences in school, our interaction with our teachers, our classmates, our friends and family, and even our community, have played a part in preparing us for what we now have to face. There are numerous challenges awaiting us. I know that every person sitting on this stage tonight will be able to overcome any obstacle, or meet any challenge that stands in the way of achieving his or her goal. They have what it takes; they have the strength, the persistance, the warmth and the compassion. They possess qualities that make me proud to be a member of the Grade 12 class, and there is not one person in my class that I don't consider a friend.

We are leaving something special behind, but we have new challenges facing us. We will be making new friends and we will become functioning adults in society. We will contribute our skills, whether they be that of a parent, a doctor, a mechanic, or an artist, to those already in existence. We will become the leaders of the social and political spheres.





We are leaving the security of life as students at L.H.S., knowing what will happen from day to day, to enter an uncertain and often traumatic world. The problems of the country will eventually fall into our hands, and, while we may not have any more answers than today's leaders do, we will be meeting them with fresh ideas and enthusiasm.

There is one last thing I would like to say to the graduates of 1980. In your quest for realizing your goals, and in making new friends, keep in mind the words of John Wesley from his book, Rules of Conduct:

Do all the good you can, In all the ways you can, In all the places you can, At all the times you can, To all the people you can, As long as you ever can.

1980 was the most successful year ever for the senior girls. The results of 1980 were the culmination of several years of hard work and practice by the girls on the school teams as well as various summer teams. As the previous year the majority of the girls played on the Lunenburg under 18 summer squad who walked away with various titles including Under 18 Provincial and Maritime Youth, Metros Woman's Soccer League, Lunenburg Indoor Invitational, and Nova Scotia Senior Woman's Championships.

Denise Cook had a good season as an attacking center half. The offense was held by Jayne Falkenham and Susan Perry: the former a great ball handler who moved the ball up field and offered fine crosses to the goal mouth and the later skilled in the art of putting the ball in the net (14 goals).

It takes 15 players to make a team and this year we had one of the finest teams ever, in spirit, as well as statistics. They deserve to be champions. Thanks ladies, and thanks Mr. Sayer for the greatest season ever.


du Fort and Château Frontenac. That evening we had a fine meal of Coq a Vin at La Bastille.
















Friday night was a very successful dance, hosted by Wayne Mitchell and Greg Larson from CJCH.
