60th ANNIVERSARY OF THE FIRE STATION

A BRIEF HISTORY

During the early years, after the founding of Lunenburg and the surrounding areas, each family, assisted by their neighbours, provided their own fire protection.

The first monetary assistance was given to the Lunenburg settlers in 1757, when Colonel Patrick Sutherland addressed the council at Halifax. Because of a previous fire, that caused severe damage, he asked that relief be given to those who suffered. The Council granted seventy pounds, approximately two hundred dollars, for this purpose.

After this, the citizens of Lunenburg realized a step must be taken to organize a group of volunteers who would be given specific responsibility in fighting fires which occurred within the township of Lunenburg. The first volunteer group, known as the "Bucket Brigade", came into existence in 1820, under the leadership of its first captain, Casper Oxner. In 1829 the group of thirty-two members took the name of the "Crown Fire Company".

Then, in 1838, a complete reorganization took place as new ideas and better protection were desired. Following this, an act was passed, in 1842, to enable the inhabitants of Lunenburg to purchase a hand pump which was considered an outstanding piece of equipment in its day.



The first operational headquarters of the Lunenburg Crown Fire Company was erected during the period between 1873 and 1879. The building stood at the corner of Prince and Cumberland Streets.

In 1885, the Town of Lunenburg purchased a Steam Fire Engine which replaced the faithful old Hand Pumper that was used for so many years. After this purchase, the department was again reorganized into the Relief Company #2 Lunenburg Fire Department. It was at this time that the motto "Deeds not Words" was adopted. The same motto is still used today. A more suitable Engine House was built between 1885 and 1886 close to the area on which the monument now stands.

It was in 1889, one year after the town's incorpration that the Town of Lunenburg took the Fire Department under its wing with certain stipulations by the Fire Department.

Then, the first water system, with hydrants, was installed in 1903 and was a major addition to the equipment and facilities used to fight fires around the community.

The cornerstone for the present fire hall was laid on June 7, 1928 on the 175th anniversary of the founding of Lunenburg. At this time, another reorganization took place and the fire department name was changed to the now existing "Lunenburg Fire Department". Many changes have been made to the existing building since 1928.

Fire protection and service is given, for the most part, by volunteers. These men and women unselfishly give of their time and energy to provide protection and safety to their communities. Providing this service requires dedication, physical exertion, endurance and often a risk to one's personal health and life. Because the Lunenburg Fire Department is no exception to these qualities, it was felt that a memorial should be established. Thus, a monument erected on October 9, 1988, honours the memory of all volunteer fire fighters who served the Town of Lunenburg and District #1 since 1928.


TO MY FELLOW GRADS..






Sandra Anne Corkum "Sandi"




Anthony Charles Crouse "Anthony"




Alan Bruce DeMone "Allay Boobay"

I, A.B.D., leave everything I own to whoever wants it, although I don't have much!




Derek James Filiatrault "Filly"

I, K.A.F., being of partially sound mind and small body, leave LHS with two years worth of great memories. And to all my fellow graduates, the best of luck with their future plans.




Felicia Priscilla Gonzalez "Flea"




Patricia Lee Ann Gurney "Gurney"




Jesalene Mary Kilfoy "Jes"


Rodney Brian Jorgen Martin "Wes"


Liza Anne May "Lisa"




Lori Christine Mossman "Lori"




Derek Morris Nowe "Derek"




Anthony Poole "Tony"




Michael James Skinner "Mike"

T.A.D.D. will benefit all those who are willing to participate by preventing negligent accidents involving alcohol. Hopefully this newly established committee will remain in L.H.S.



We will be back in 1991.






