WE RESPOND TO GOD'S WORD

*AFFIRMATION OF FAITH (taken from The Scots Confession)

We confess and acknowledge one God, to whom alone we must cleave, whom alone we must serve, whom only we must worship, and in whom alone we put our trust. Who is eternal, infinite, immeasurable, income pre-hensible, omnipotent, invisible; one in substance and yet distinct in three persons, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost. By whom we confess all things in heaven and earth, visible and invisible, to have been created, to be retained in their being, and to be ruled and guided by God's inscrutable providence, for such end as His eternal wisdom, goodness, and justice have appointed, and to the manifestation of his own glory. Amen.

(The Scots Confession was written at a turning point in Scottish history. When the Queen Regent Mary of Guise died in her sleep in 1560, the Protestant nobility of Scotland was able to secure English recognition of Scottish sovereignty in the Treaty of Edinburgh. The Scottish Parliament, having declared Scotland a Protestant nation, asked the clergy to frame a confession of faith. Six ministers, including John Knox, completed their work in four days. In 1560, the document was ratified by Parliament as "doctrine grounded upon the infallible Word of God." ... "Cleave, serve, worship, trust" are key words in the document. As a call to action in a turbulent time, the Scots Confession reflects a spirit of trust and a commitment to the God whose miraculous deliverance the Scots had experienced firsthand.)

THE KIRKIN' O' THE TARTANS and BLESSING OF THE FAMILIES

On April 16, 1746, on Culloden Moor, the Clan system of Scotland came to a tragic end. The Jacobite army led by Charles Edward Stuart, or Bonnie Prince Charlie, was dramatically defeated by the English forces led by the Duke of Cumberland. No quarter was given the wounded or the captured.

Following Culloden, a merciless persecution of the highlands brought the forbidding of the kilt, the bag-pipes and all else Scottish, including wearing of the Tartan. Tradition has it that the Scots hid small pieces of their tartans and held them as a dear sign of their being an independent people. These small pieces of tartan they would bring to the Kirk to be blessed and to show their faith in the Almighty.

It was in 1943 that the Reverend Doctor Peter Marshall, a Scot and a minister of New York Avenue Pres-byterian Church in Washington, D.C. and who later became Chaplain of the United States Senate, introduced this ceremony to American Presbyterians. It was his intent to show honor to the World War II Scottish soldiers, as well as to introduce this rich legacy of Scottish heritage of the Presbyterian Church that has its foundations on the rocky isles, rugged highlands, and fertile lowlands of Scotland.

And, as we speak aloud the name our families (Scottish or not), we hold high our tartan, wear or lift up proudly our

heritage symbol, and with bold voice, we speak our family name NOW:_____

us, that no matter what our heritage is, we are the work of your hands. In Jesus Christ, you have called us by name! We belong to you! As we bear our names and wear the symbols of our clans, call us in your power to be your faithful people, to live in peace, to work your justice and to proclaim the good news of

salvation. We give ourselves to you, in the name of Jesus Christ. Amen.

Understanding the Kirkin'

Kirk is Scottish for church, and the Tartan, with its distinctive cross-lined patterns, represents Scottish clans, families, regions, and regiments. The Kirkin' o' the Tartans was introduced in the United States by Reverend Dr. Peter Marshall on April 27, 1941 at New York Avenue Presbyterian Church, Washington, DC.

What is a tartan? Scots from the highland regions have been extraordinary weavers since ancient times. They wove brightly colored patterns in wool. The Roman historian, Virgil, reported them wearing such patterns. Tartan comes from the Gaelic *tarsainn*, checkered design (*breacan* in Gaelic). A *plaid* is a blanket in tartan worn over the shoulder, but plaid has become interchangeable with tartan. Weavers would use the same pattern over and again, thus local purchasers would become known by the pattern they wore. The English Proscription prohibited the wearing of native highland dress, (clothing) including kilts or any tartan from 1746 to 1782.

The Romantic Revival period of the early 1800s saw a renewed interest in highland dress. In 1822, King George IV of England visited Scotland. A grand ball was arranged by the Scottish romantic writer, Sir Walter Scott. Everyone, (even lowlanders whose families never wore kilts) including the King wore tartan kilts.

The English Queen Victoria's love of Scotland made the use of tartans popular throughout the 1800s. Clan (family) tartan patterns were "discovered" and the canny Scots developed the clan tartan industry. Tartans are now made for clans, political districts, military units, merchandisers and organizations. You may find a clan tartan in ancient, modern, dress, and hunting patterns. The Lord Lyon King of Arms is the recorder of official tartan patterns.

What is a Clan? Although the popular concept of a Scottish *clann* (clan) is that of an extended family, historically, the members of a clan were those *septs* (families) who aligned with a particular *laird* (chief). Unlike the feudal system under which leaders inherited their positions, the Scottish highland chiefs were elected. The clans identified themselves by what they wore on their *bonnets* (hats). Typically, it was a plant native to their locale such as cranberry, bog myrtle, or a type of pine. They also adopted a *sluggarn* (slogan or motto) to identify themselves.

What is a kilt? In ancient times the Scots wore a *feiladh mor*. A long wide piece of wool cloth, it could be pleated and belted around the waist, thrown over the shoulder, tied between the legs and cover a person from head to toe. It could even be used as a sleeping bag! "Kilted" means to be pleated above the knee. The modern men's kilt is pleated in the back, flat in the front and has the opening on the wearer's right. Wearing a kilt also calls for knee socks with "flashed" garters to keep them up. A *sporran* is a pouch worn in front to make up for the lack of pockets. A *sgian dubh*, a short utility knife, is worn in a sock. All types of hats, shirts, vests and jackets may be worn with a kilt. There are many types of accoutrements (the "kit") which can be worn with highland dress including belts, clan badges, kilt pins, *dirks* (small swords), sashes, etc. However, only a clan chief should wear feathers in his hat!

Who is the "Beadle"? The office of Beadle dates from pre-Christian times when a doorkeeper was responsible for opening places of worship to the faithful and keeping unbelievers out. The Latin word *bedellus* means summoner. Beadle is the shortened Scottish version. Before the printing press, the Beadle was responsible for safeguarding the handwritten Bible, as there might be only one in an entire community, and bringing it to church for Services. The Beadle called the faithful to church, kept order in it, and also tracked down (summoned) those who did not attend. Now largely ceremonial and honorary, the Beadle carries the Bible, the centerpiece of faith, into and out of the Sanc-tuary.

John Knox - Scottish Reformer: Knox studied under John Calvin (the father of Presbyterian Theology) in Geneva, Switzerland in the 1550s. Upon returning to Scotland, he wrote the 1564 Book of Church Order and established the first Presbyterian churches. He also was the central theologian for the writing of *The Scots Confession*. The church spread to Northern Ireland and immigrants from Scotland and Ireland brought the Presbyterian Church to America.
