Honoring Four Decades of Impact: The History of NYSDRA

Founded in 1985, the New York State Dispute Resolution Association (NYSDRA) emerged as a statewide leader in the alternative dispute resolution (ADR) movement, providing advocacy, coordination, and professional support to Community Dispute Resolution Centers (CDRCs) and ADR practitioners across New York State. As the field of ADR gained national momentum in the 1980s, NYSDRA was established to unify and strengthen the growing network of CDRCs that had been launched through a state-funded initiative by the Unified Court System.

NYSDRA's early efforts focused on institutionalizing mediation programs, sharing resources, and providing a forum for training, collaboration, and quality assurance. The association became a crucial voice in promoting the value of mediation, especially for underserved communities and marginalized groups. It fostered a culture of inclusivity, professional development, and innovation in dispute resolution practice, guided by the principles of neutrality, accessibility, and community empowerment.

Throughout the 1990s and 2000s, NYSDRA expanded its scope by collaborating with state agencies, courts, schools, and advocacy organizations to integrate mediation into areas such as family dynamics, special education, workplace conflict, agriculture, mental health, and restorative justice. It developed model standards for mediators and dispute resolution programs, supported credentialing efforts, and increased its emphasis on diversity, equity, and inclusion within the field.

The organization also took a proactive role in legislative advocacy and policy development, ensuring ongoing support for the CDRC network and championing the use of ADR in addressing emerging societal challenges. NYSDRA's annual conferences became a hallmark of professional engagement and thought leadership, drawing practitioners, academics, and public officials from across the state and beyond.

Today, NYSDRA continues to be a trusted convener, educator, and advocate, celebrating 40 years of advancing access to justice and strengthening communities through peaceful conflict resolution. Its legacy is reflected in the thousands of New Yorkers who have been empowered to resolve disputes constructively and respectfully outside of the courtroom, and in ways that foster long-term understanding and healing.

JAMS Panelist Sukhsimranjit Singh is the Founder and CEO of Singh Academy. He also serves as Director of Global Development, Outreach and Leadership at Weinstein International Foundation, where he works closely with the Foundation's Board of Directors and Senior Leadership to facilitate the growth of the Foundation worldwide. Previously he served as Judge Danny Weinstein Managing Director of the Straus Institute for Dispute Resolution at Pepperdine University Caruso School of Law, where he also served as Professor of Law and Practice and directed the LL.M programs. Dr. Singh oversaw the Institute's global outreach efforts, world-class professional training programs, and rigorous academic curriculum.

Recipient of many awards including the Cloke-Millen Peackemaker Award, the Gold Medal by the Judiciary of Brazil and an Award of Recognition by the LAPD, City of Los Angeles, Dr. Singh's practice, teaching, and scholarship focuses on cross-cultural dispute resolution, faith-based mediation, and utilizing modern theories, science, and technology to devise creative solutions for global disputes.

Dr. Singh currently serves as the mediator for Willamette University's Atkinson Graduate School of Management, where he identifies and resolves organizational conflicts, and for the City of Beverly Hills, where he was recently nominated for the city's annual Peace Award.

Robert A. Baruch Bush, Rains Distinguished Professor of Alternative Dispute Resolution, Maurice A. Deane School of Law at Hofstra University; Co-Founder and Board Member, Institute for the Study of Conflict Transformation.

Professor Bush's scholarship and teaching focuses on mediation and alternative dispute resolution. He is one of the originators of the "Transformative Approach" to mediation, as explained in his best-selling book, The Promise of Mediation (1994, 2d ed. 2005), coauthored with Dr. Joseph Folger and translated into six languages. Bush has practiced, taught and written about mediation for over 40 years, authoring five books and more than thirty articles/chapters on mediation and ADR.

His latest article is "Beyond the Toolbox: Value-Based Models of Mediation Practice" published by *Cardozo Journal of Conflict Resolution* in 2023. In 2017, Bush received, together with co-author and colleague Joseph Folger, the Association of Conflict Resolution's "William Kreidler Award for Distinguished Service to the field of Conflict Resolution." In 2022, he received the "L. Randolph Lowry Educator of the Year Award" from the Southern California Mediation Association.



2025 Lawrence H. Cooke Peace Innovator Award Honoree



John S. Kiernan, Esq.

John S. Kiernan is a retired partner of Debevoise & Plimpton LLP, where he served as Co-Chair of the Litigation Department and Chair of the firm's Ethics Committee. Now practicing as a mediator and arbitrator both independently and with Phillips ADR Enterprises, John brings decades of experience resolving complex commercial disputes. His legal practice spanned a wide range of areas including corporate governance, securities, mass torts, intellectual property, and international treaty claims.

A nationally recognized leader in the field, John has long championed access to justice and the use of alternative dispute resolution to resolve conflict fairly and efficiently. He currently serves as Co-Chair of the New York Chief Judge's Advisory Committee on Alternative Methods of Dispute Resolution and sits on the New York State Permanent Commission on Access to Justice. His leadership has extended to many justice-related nonprofits, including service as Board Chair of the International Institute for Conflict Prevention and Resolution (CPR), Legal Services-NYC, the Lawyers' Committee for Civil Rights Under Law, and the Justice Resource Center.

In addition to his extensive contributions to the legal field, John has supported numerous community and education initiatives through volunteer leadership, mentorship, and service. He is the current Board Chair of Prisoners' Legal Services of New York and the William Nelson Cromwell Foundation, and Co-Chair of the Inner-City Scholarship Fund, Lawyers Division. John is also a former President of the New York City Bar Association and has taught as an adjunct professor at NYU Law School. He holds a B.A. and J.D., both magna cum laude, from Harvard University and Harvard Law School.

A Legacy 40 Years in the Making

At tonight's NYSDRA Legacy Conference 2025, we proudly celebrate the transformative vision of Chief Judge Lawrence H. Cooke (1914–2000)—a jurist whose leadership reshaped access to justice in New York State.

Judge Cooke believed that "justice should be the right of everyone, not just the privileged."

Guided by this conviction, he became a driving force behind the creation of New York's Community Dispute Resolution Centers (CDRCs) program in the late 1970s and early 1980s—the first statewide network of its kind in the United States. Today, that network serves all 62 counties, providing New Yorkers with alternatives to costly, protracted litigation and opening doors to community-based conflict resolution.

Throughout his career—as Sullivan County Judge, Supreme Court Justice, Appellate Division Judge, and ultimately Chief Judge of the New York Court of Appeals—Cooke championed fairness, access, and innovation. He implemented reforms to reduce court backlogs, introduced technology to improve efficiency, and established the Task Force on Women in the Courts to confront bias and expand equity in the justice system. Known for his humility and integrity, Judge Cooke also dedicated himself to teaching, mentoring, and serving his community, leaving a legacy of justice rooted in compassion and inclusion.

This year, as NYSDRA marks its 40th anniversary, we reflect on Judge Cooke's vision, celebrate the system he helped build, and look ahead to the future of dispute resolution in New York.

And—because true legacies are meant to grow—we will be sharing exciting news about a new way Judge Cooke's innovative spirit will continue shaping New York's justice system for generations to come.


